USC President James B. Holderman will address the convocation and introduce Governor Carroll Campbell Jr., who will deliver the keynote address.

In recognition of their service to the college, the Founders Medallion will be presented to Novie M. Nelson of Myrtle Beach; Catherine H. Lewis of Conway; and posthumously to William A. and Maud W. Kimbel.

A reception will follow the program in the Student Center - overflow area.

Classes will be suspended on Friday, from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m., so that faculty, staff and students may attend the convocation.

## Coastal To Host SCAHPERD Convention

Coastal will host the South Carolina Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance (SCAHPERD) convention, Friday, March 2 through Sunday, March 4 at the college. The convention was originally scheduled to be held in the fall at the Landmark Hotel in Myrtle Beach, but was canceled due to Hurricane Hugo.

The convention is open to all SCAHPERD members; however, individuals who are not members may participate in conference activities by paying a \$5 guest membership fee.

Pre-convention workshops will begin at 9 a.m., Friday, March 2. Workshops will be held on Red Cross CPR Training, Education Dance in Physical Education curriculum, and Project Wild to be held at Myrtle Beach State Park. There is an additional fee charged to attend pre-convention workshops.

The convention will feature programs in the areas of soccer, swimming, handball, track, badminton, modern dance, and folk dance. Some of the topics to be discussed will include developing professionalism in students, student injuries in the physical education class, new cholesterol guidelines and the National Cholesterol Education Program, how to organize and promote a college body, and suggested activities and lesson plan ideas for drug education.

## "Big River" To Be Presented At Coastal

"Big River," a musical adaptation of Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn*, will be presented at Coastal, Monday, March 5 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

This road-company production of *Big River* is based on a book by William Hauptman, which was adapted from the novel Mark Twain.



The show features the music and lyrics of Roger Miller, displaying a happy, toe-tapping mix of today's country music and yesterday's barn dances along with gospel rhythms. Miller's music has been described as a capturing of the adventure and spirit of *Huckleberry Finn*, while highlighting the anguish of the character of Jim, the runaway slave.

"If we woke up Mark Twain now," muses Miller, "I hope I would have his blessing. I wanted to capture what Twain was feeling when he wrote the story. I'm not a Mark Twain scholar, but I think he was looking at the world with a jaundiced eye. Sort of with a wry in his eye when commenting on the human race."

## **Black History Month Celebration Continues At Coastal**

"Salute to Education," the final program of Coastal's annual Afro-American Black History Month celebration, will be Wednesday, February 28, at 7 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The keynote speaker will be Dr. Agnes Hilderbrand Wilson. The program is free and open to the public.

Dr. Wilson prepared for her career in education through advanced study at six universities, including study at the University of Paris as a Fulbright Scholar. She retired after serving more than 30 years as a public school teacher. Dr. Wilson was recognized in 1969 as South Carolina Teacher of the Year. She is past president of the USC Center for Community Education in Columbia and was appointed to the White House Conference on Children and Youth. She is immediate past president of the South Carolina Retired Teachers Association and is active in the United Presbyterian Church. Dr. Wilson is an ambassador of goodwill in all her endeavors.

Awards will be presented to selected retired teachers for their contributions to education. This year's recipients are Cecil C. Bellamy, Leslie Legette, and Evelyn Snider of Conway and Alberta Frazier of Burgess.

## Graduate And Continuing Education To Host National Conference On Aging

Graduate and Continuing Education will host "Longevity in America: Beyond the Linear Life Plan," a national conference on aging, Tuesday, March 27 and Wednesday, March 28.

The conference offers professionals who work in the field of aging and related gerontological issues, the opportunity to share information that has evolved from study, research and first-hand experience. The conference will focus on the implications and impact longevity in America will have on the next century.

Dr. K. Warner Schaie, internationally known lecturer, author and director of cognitive research involving the elderly, will be a featured speaker at the conference. Schaie

is currently Evan Rugh Professor of Human Development and Psychology and director of the Gerontology Center at Pennsylvania State University. Schaie has been the recipient of millions of dollars in grant money for research in the area of aging.

Dr. Sherry Willis, also with the University of Pennsylvania, as professor of human development and psychology, will speak at the event. Willis's expertise is in research and teaching in adult development and aging.

## USC Coastal To Host Conference At Allen University

The Comprehensive Enrichment Program in International Studies, coordinated by USC Coastal, will present the conference "Global Perspectives and the University and College General Studies Core Curriculum," Monday, March 5 and Tuesday, March 6, at Allen University in Columbia.

Keynote speaker will be The Honorable Godfrey L. Binaisa, former president of Uganda and personal friend of Nelson Mandela.

Binaisa was elected president of Uganda in 1979 by the National Consultation Council after Idi Amin was defeated. He was not president even a year before military officers non-violently overthrew him.

During his presidential tenure, he worked to prepare Uganda for parliamentary elections. After the coup that ousted him, he fled to London where he practiced law. In 1987, he came to the United States and now lives in Brooklyn.

Binaisa has served as a member of the International Commission of Jurists, an arbitrator for the International Arbitration Tribunal in Stockholm, Sweden, and chairman of the Salaries Review Commission for East Africa Posts and Telecommunications. He has extensive legal experience serving as international commercial consultant to various industries, governments and international organizations; barrister-at-law (England and Wales), Inns of Court, Lincoln's Inn in London; and was appointed to serve on the Queen's Counsel in London.

Coastal faculty will be the presenters of other conference sessions.

Monday sessions will include: "Terrorism and Intercommunal Violence in the Modern World," Dr. Richard Collin; "Introducing India to the General Studies Core Curriculum," Preston McKeever-Floyd and Glenda Sweet; "Education in Africa, Cameroon and Kenya," Dr. Richard Koesterer; "Integrating the Black Experience into Latin American Content Courses," Dr. James Henderson; "The Faculty Exchange Experience," Dr. Lance Bedwell and Dr. Randall Wells.

Tuesday sessions will include: "New Realities in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union," Dr. James Farsolas; and "The USC at Oxford Program - the Experience of Traveling with Students," Dr. Robert N. Robinson.

The conference will conclude by 12 noon, Tuesday.



The Comprehensive Enrichment Program in International Studies was developed to improve undergraduate education in international studies by planning and executing a series of curricular and extra-curricular activities for students and teachers. The overall aim of the program is to increase international awareness of faculty and young men and women, providing mechanisms that will support long-term changes geared to the acquisition of international competence.

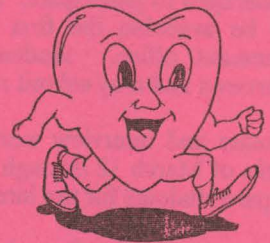

### How Fats Affect Your Heart

Saturated fats are known to increase the body's levels of serum (blood) cholesterol. Along with cholesterol, saturated fats can deposit on the inner walls of blood vessels - a condition known as atherosclerosis. When the heart's arteries become clogged with cholesterol and fats, blood flow can be restricted or totally blocked, leading to severe chest pain and heart attack.
