Coastal Carolina College Presents Founders Medallions

In honor of their service to Coastal Carolina College Novie M. Nelson of Myrtle Beach, Catherine Lewis of Conway, and the late William A. and L. Maud Windeler Kimbel of Murrells Inlet, were presented the Founders Medallion at the Founders Day Convocation, Friday, March 2. The keynote speaker for the convocation was South Carolina Governor Carroll A. Campbell Jr.

Announcement of the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration Building, scheduled for completion by academic year 1991-92, also was made during the program, by local business leaders.

Novie Nelson, who has family roots in Alabama, came to Myrtle Beach in the 1940s by way of California. A graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, Massachusetts, Nelson also attended the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa and the College of the Pacific in Stockton, California.

Along with her husband Jack W. Nelson, she built the first luxury motel on the Grand Strand in 1946. This motel, the El Rancho, was featured in several nationally circulated magazines in the 1950s, including Look, Fortune, Guide for the Bride, and The Saturday Evening Post. In 1954 Look magazine named El Rancho one of the ten best motels in the United States. In 1960 Mr. and Mrs. Nelson opened the first campground in Myrtle Beach, Lake Arrowhead Campground, with 144 acres. Parade magazine featured an article on Lake Arrowhead Campground.

Nelson is a member of the Alpha Chi Omega Sorority; a member of the Guild of Organists; a member of the Christian Science Church of Myrtle Beach, where she has served as an organist; a past member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc.; a past member of the Wheelwright Council for the Arts; a member of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series Committee; a member of the Dunes Club and the Ladies Golf Association of the Dunes Club; and a member of the Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild. Her hobbies are dancing, music and painting.

Often working behind the scenes, Nelson has provided moral and financial support to many Coastal students through scholarship and cultural opportunities. She and her late husband have actively supported Coastal Carolina College, especially in the marine science and fine arts areas.

Catherine Heniford Lewis was born in Richmond, Virginia, the daughter of Davis Oscar and Katherine Wright Hammack Heniford. She received a B.A. degree in English and Latin from Coker College in 1943; an M.A. degree in English from the University of North Carolina in 1945; and a B.S. degree in library science from UNC in 1948.

Lewis served as Horry County Memorial Library's head librarian for twenty-seven years. Prior to that she was head librarian at Coastal Carolina Junior College; reviewer and bibliographer for the U.S. Information Agency; assistant librarian for the School of Advanced International Studies; and bibliographer for the Library of Congress Copyright Office.

Lewis has assumed numerous community and state positions through the years. Presently she is a lecturer on Horry County history for the Continuing Education division of Waccamaw Records; chairman of the board of Playcard Environmental Education Center; a member of the board of directors of the Pee Dee Heritage Center; and is a member of the Southeastern South Carolina and Waccamaw Library associations. She is the author of several articles on Horry County history that have been published in various local and state publications and in The Independent Republic Quarterly.

The South Carolina State Library presented Lewis its Distinguished Service Award in 1987. Lewis also has been honored with the Community Award of Merit from Coastal Carolina College in 1984; the Ernest Edward Richardson Award for service to the Horry County Historical Society in 1981; Field and Herald Woman of the Year award in 1973 and 1982; and the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. award for meritorious service in 1967. She was the first Wayne S. Yenawine Lecturer at the University of South Carolina in 1986.

Lewis has three sons: Alan Hammack Lewis, Kevin George Lewis and Paul Heniford Lewis.

William A. Kimbel and L. Maud Windeler Kimbel came to South Carolina in 1942 and built their home overlooking the river on Wachesaw Plantation. Because of their interest in hunting, the couple had been frequent visitors for nearly two decades before they made their permanent home on the land which the family had acquired in the late 1920s.

L. Maud Windeler Kimbel was born June 14, 1895, in Boston, Massachusetts, the daughter of George Herbert Windeler and Laura Wheelwright. She was a member of the Church of the Resurrection.

William A. Kimbel was born in New York City, January 5, 1888. He received a bachelor of science degree in architecture from Columbia University in 1909 and studied architecture in Europe. For nineteen years, Kimbel was

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president of A. Kimbel & Son, an architectural and decorative contractor and manufacturer, in New York City. After moving to South Carolina, he became owner and publisher of *The Myrtle Beach News* from 1946 to 1948.

A close friend of President Eisenhower, Kimbel held several high-level government positions after serving in World War I and II. He was appointed by President Eisenhower to serve as a U.S. delegate and head of the U.S. Delegation to the Economic Conferences for Europe for two years. In 1955, he was appointed advisor to the U.S. Delegation to conferences of Educational, Social and Cultural Organization in Geneva. He served on the boards of several hospitals and educational institutions including the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. of which he was elected president in 1965.

The Kimbels generously supported Coastal Carolina College during the years they lived in the community of Wachesaw Plantation in Murrells Inlet. Together, the Kimbels gave more than \$1 million toward the construction of Wheelwright Auditorium and an additional \$1 million toward other construction projects at Coastal. Through their kindness and their belief in giving local students an opportunity to have quality higher education, the Kimbels also provided scholarship funds for more than 100 Waccamaw area students who attended Coastal. The college's popular Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series received a \$50,000 endowment in June 1983 through the Kimbel Trust, established by the Kimbel's estate.

Mr. Kimbel died December 20, 1980, and Mrs. Kimbel died April 29, 1982.

Founders Day is an annual event at Coastal Carolina College, during which individuals who have contributed to the historic and academic significance of physical development of the college are recognized and given the Founders Medallion.

"Big River" To Be Presented At Coastal

"Big River," a musical adaptation of Mark Twain's Huckleberry Finn, will be presented at Coastal, Monday, March 5 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

This road-company production of Big River is based on a book by William Hauptman, which was adapted from the novel Mark Twain.

The show features the music and lyrics of Roger Miller, displaying a happy, toe-tapping mix of today's country music and yesterday's barn dances along with gospel rhythms. Miller's music has been described as a capturing of the adventure and spirit of *Huckleberry Finn*, while highlighting the anguish of the character of Jim, the runaway slave.

"If we woke up Mark Twain now," muses Miller, "I hope I would have his blessing. I wanted to capture what Twain was feeling when he wrote the story."

Pianist Ray Dudley To Perform At Coastal

Pianist Ray Dudley, described as "one of the best pianists of his generation," in the Saturday Review, will perform in concert at Coastal, Sunday, March 11, 4 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The concert is free and open to the public.

Dudley, a graduate of the Royal Conservatory in Toronto, was born in Canada. He is presently artist-in-residence and professor of piano at the University of South Carolina in Columbia, and visiting-artist-in-residence at Coastal.

Dudley has appeared with 100 orchestras including the New York Philharmonic and London Philharmonic. He has performed in the London and New York concert halls Carnegie, Avery Fisher, Alice Tully, Lincoln Center, Royal Festival, Royal Albert and Wigmore Halls London.

He is the only pianist in the world to have performed the complete Sonatas of Haydn in eight weekly concerts in London. His recording of 4 Haydn Sonatas was picked as Record of the Year. He has been awarded Canada's top Eaton Award, Three Senior Arts Grants from the Canada Council, the Geneva International Prize, and the British Commonwealth Medal in London and the Silver Heart Medal, Milan.

Dudley has given concerts and conducted master classes in China, Hong Kong, Japan and Taiwan, Beijing's Concert Hall, Beijing and Shanghai Conservatories, Shanxi University, Taiyuan National University, Taipei. Dudley also has given concerts in Santiago, Valparaiso and Vina del Mar, Chile, and had the honor of participating in a nationally televised concert that celebrated the 85th birthday of Claudio Arrau, world famous pianist and Chilean national hero.

Andrew Porter of *The New Yorker*, writes "Of recent New York recitals, one that stays with me is Ray Dudley's....sensitive, romantic, now rapt, now fiery....snap and sparkle...tremendous."

Dudley's performance at Coastal will feature works by Haydn, Schumann, Liszt, and Ravel.
