### **Pianist Ray Dudley To Perform** At Coastal

Pianist Ray Dudley, described as "one of the best pianists of his generation," in the *Saturday Review*, will perform in concert at Coastal, Sunday, March 11, 4 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The concert is free and open to the public.

Dudley, a graduate of the Royal Conservatory in Toronto, was born in Canada. He is presently artist-in-residence and professor of piano at the University of South Carolina in Columbia, and visiting-artist-in-residence at Coastal.

Dudley has appeared with 100 orchestras including the New York Philharmonic and London Philharmonic. He has performed in the London and New York concert halls Carnegie, Avery Fisher, Alice Tully, Lincoln Center, Royal Festival, Royal Albert and Wigmore Halls London.

He is the only pianist in the world to have performed the complete Sonatas of Haydn in eight weekly concerts in London. His recording of 4 Haydn Sonatas was picked as Record of the Year. He has been awarded Canada's top Eaton Award, Three Senior Arts Grants from the Canada Council, the Geneva International Prize, and the British Commonwealth Medal in London and the Silver Heart Medal, Milan.

Dudley has given concerts and conducted master classes in China, Hong Kong, Japan and Taiwan, Beijing's Concert Hall, Beijing and Shanghai Conservatories, Shanxi University, Taiyuan National University, Taipei. Dudley also has given concerts in Santiago, Valparaiso and Vina del Mar, Chile, and had the honor of participating in a nationally televised concert that celebrated the 85th birthday of Claudio Arrau, world famous pianist and Chilean national hero.

Andrew Porter of *The New Yorker*, writes "Of recent New York recitals, one that stays with me is Ray Dudley's....sensitive, romantic, now rapt, now fiery....snap and sparkle...tremendous."

Dudley's performance at Coastal will feature works by Haydn, Schumann, Liszt, and Ravel.

### "Les Petits Violons" To Perform At Coastal

"Les Petits Violons," directed by Jean Cousineau, will perform at Coastal, Friday, March 23 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

The "Les Petits Violons" school was founded in 1965 and has an enrollment of approximately 40 pupils between the ages of five and twenty-five years old. The ensemble demonstrates the perfecting of musical training the pupils have received through the Cousineau approach, which has for several years produced young musicians of great quality who work either as professional performers or music teachers.

The success of the school is primarily due to a philosophy conceived by director Cousineau. From the age of five, a child learns to "sing" music. The parents are actually partners in teaching and are intimately linked with the didactic process, tackling simultaneously the technique of violin playing, sight-reading and interpretation centered on ensemble playing. The course gradually follows a uniform method which progresses to a high professional level.

Founded in 1974, the ensemble is a way of perfecting the musical training received from the school. The ensemble allows pupils to "practice their profession" in order to continue learning. Due to a vast repertoire, the students can perfect their assimilation of the principal technical points, rudimentary theory needed for reading; sense of phrasing; sense of rhythm; and sense of the responsibility required by the act of playing as a group member.

The ensemble's achievements include the recording of six LP's, and many concerts at the National Centre in Ottawa,

Le Grand Theatre and Festival d'ete' de Quebec, The Guelph Spring Festival, Rideau Hall in Ottawa, the International Congress of the ISME at Warsaw, Poland, Acade'mie estivale internationale at Bourges in France, and in several cities in Southwest France, notably Toulouse and Montauban.

Cousineau earned a bachelor of arts degree from the College Ste-Marie, Montreal and studied music in Paris with Rene' Benedetti (violin) and Renee Jamet-Hansen (harmony and counterpoint). He also has studied the Suzuki method in Japan with Shinichi Suzuki, while acting as delegated observer for Laval University School of Music in Quebec. He received his doctorate in educational sciences from Montreal University.

Cousineau has been the recipient of the Orchestration award at the Sopot Festival for Jack Monoloy in 1964; the Canadian Film award for the film music of *Mon Oncle Antoine* in 1971; a Gold medal at Bergame International for the music of *Mon Oncle Antoine* in 1972; special mention by the Canadian Council of music for the record *Les Petits Violons* LUL 501 in 1977; and the Anik award for the music of the film *Dreamspeaker* in 1977.

Maureen Peterson of the Ottawa Journal has remarked of the ensemble, "There is no word but magical to describe the electricity and vibrance that pervades their performance."

Marc Carles, director of the National Music School of Tarn, France has stated, "From the opening bars one is struck by the perfect togetherness. At simple signs and looks from the conductor, the wonderfully well-ordered mechanism sets off into motion with the precision of a clock...Only through continuous work enables the acquisition of such exactitude -- so difficult with string playing..."

The ensemble receives financial aid from the Ministry of Cultural Affairs, Province of Quebec.

Tickets are \$15, \$8 for students, and are available at Wheelwright box office, ext. 2502.

"Les Petits Violons" was scheduled as part of the Passport Series as a replacement for the Youth Orchestra of Spain and the Tchaikovsky Orchestra, which was cancelled during September. Passport holders should use the gold tickets issued for the September events.
