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

### Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award Recipient Announced

Bennett A. Brown, chief executive officer of the Citizens and Southern Corporation in Atlanta, Georgia has been named the recipient of the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award. Brown was recently recognized for the achievement during Coastal's annual business week, where Bennett was a guest speaker.

"As the first recipient of the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award, Mr. Brown is establishing a very high standard for other business leaders who will compete for the recognition of the award in the years to come," said Chancellor Ron Eaglin. "Mr. Brown's achievements in rising to the top of an almost \$50 billion corporation are most impressive. To have achieved this success is very remarkable."

Eaglin added that Brown's characteristics of success were the deciding factors in the selection process.

Brown is a native of Kingstree, South Carolina and holds a bachelor's degree from Presbyterian College, Clinton, South Carolina. He is a graduate of the Louisiana State University School of Banking of the South and the Advanced Management Program at Harvard University's Graduate School of Business Administration.

Brown joined the Citizens and Southern National Bank in 1955, and headed the C&S banks in Augusta, Georgia from 1965 to 1971. In 1971 he became assistant president of the bank. In 1972, he assumed the additional role of president of Citizens and Southern Holding Company. He became chief executive officer of both the bank and C&S Georgia Corporation in 1978. He served as chairman for both in 1979.

The Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Hall of Fame was established to honor those business leaders who have risen "through the ranks" to a position of prominence in American industry. The establishment of the Hall, which will be permanently housed in the new Wall School of Business building, was made possible through a grant from the family of the late Jason Ammons, a prominent local businessman, for the purpose of educating students and the local community with respect to the operation and opportunities within the free enterprise system.

# **USC Coastal To Begin Community Drive**

Volunteers representing USC Coastal will visit area businesses Monday, March 26 through Friday, April 6, during the college's spring community drive. Business people will be asked to make pledges in support of Coastal's Annual Fund. Gifts to the Annual Fund help provide scholarships, fund faculty research and provide for special academic and cultural programs. The gifts allow the college to offer opportunities to students and the community that it otherwise could not afford. Many of the events offered at Wheelwright Auditorium are funded in part through private gifts.

"The college was founded in response to community needs for higher education and local support has contributed greatly to its rapid growth in quality and size," says James J. Johnson, a director of the Coastal Educational Foundation and chairman of the community drive. "Area residents have traditionally responded graciously and generously when asked to support Coastal and we look forward to a continuation of that response."

"Coastal has a dynamic past and high ambitions for the future," Johnson added. "With continued community support, those ambitions will be realized."

Since it was established in 1954, Coastal has grown to become the second largest campus in the University of South Carolina System and a state leader in higher education. Under the guidance of Chancellor Ronald G. Eaglin, the college has established a reputation for quality academics and service to the community.

### Oakland Ballet To Perform At Coastal

The Oakland Ballet, one of the West's major professional ballet companies, will perform at Coastal, Thursday, April 5 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Oakland Ballet was founded in 1965 by Ronn Guidi. During the past two decades, the company has earned an outstanding reputation for the preservation of ballet masterworks from the Diaghilev and early 20th century repertoires and the presentation of innovative contemporary choreography. "To watch The Oakland Ballet," wrote the late dean of American dance critics, Walter Terry, "is an enthralling, bewitching, riveting experience." The San Francisco Chronicle says "Oakland Ballet is a jewel of the American dance scene."

Pursuing an artistic course emphasizing what is unique, innovative and historically significant, The Oakland Ballet has set standards of excellence and daring which rival larger companies. The Oakland Ballet is recognized nationwide

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for its diverse repertoire, ranging from 20th century masterpieces to works by contemporary choreographers. In response to the demands of this varied repertoire, Oakland Ballet dancers display a distinctive style that is freshly classical, reflecting energy, enthusiasm and a dramatic flair.

The Oakland Ballet performs before a total audience of 150,000 each year while at home and on tour. The company presents its Bay Area performances every September through December at Oakland's Paramount Theatre and U.C. Berkeley's Zellerbach Hall. From February through May The Oakland Ballet tours California and the nation, acting as a Bay Area cultural ambassador as the company entertains audiences in more than 20 cities each year. In total, The Oakland Ballet presents over 60 performances annually.

Oakland Ballet Artistic Director Ronn Guidi, who believes teaching is as great an art as dancing, studied ballet for ten years under the late Raoul Pause, director of the Ballet Players Guild of Oakland. From 1958-61, Guidi lived in Italy, Germany and Denmark, expanding his knowledge of classical dance. Upon his return to the United States, he taught for three years as associate supervisor of ballet at the University of California, Berkeley and was principal dancer with Pause's company. Guidi started choreographing ballets for Pause, and was named associate director of the company (renamed Oakland Civic Ballet) in 1961. In 1965, Guidi founded the Oakland Ballet and three years later opened the Oakland Ballet Academy, which serves as the primary training ground for future Oakland Ballet dancers.

Among his many awards and honors, Guidi was awarded the first Bay Area Dance Coalition Isadora Duncan Award for Innovation in 1985, and in 1986 was honored by the Marcus Foster Educational Institute as a distinguished alumni of the Oakland Public Schools.

The only West Coast ballet company to have been awarded grants from the National Choreography Project, The Oakland Ballet's full-length ballets include Coppelia (Savino-Jenner), Giselle (Frederic Franklin after Petipa), Hansel and Gretel (Guidi), Nutcracker (Guidi), and Crystal Slipper ("Cinderella"-Carvajal).

# **Coastal To Host National Conference On Aging**

Graduate and Continuing Education will host "Longevity in America: Beyond the Linear Life Plan," a national conference on aging, Tuesday, March 27 and Wednesday, March 28. The conference will be held at the Beach Cove/Clarion Resort, Oceanfront at 48th Avenue South, North Myrtle Beach.

The conference offers professionals who work in the field of aging and related gerontological issues, the opportunity to share information that has evolved from study, research and first-hand experience. The conference will focus on the implications and impact longevity in America will have on the next century.

Dr. K. Warner Schaie, internationally known lecturer, author and director of cognitive research involving the elderly, will be a featured speaker at the conference. Schaie is currently Evan Pugh Professor of Development and Psychology and director of the Gerontology Center at Pennsylvania State University. He has been the recipient of millions of dollars in grant money for research in the area of aging.

Dr. Sherry Willis, also with the University of Pennsylvania, as professor of human development and psychology, will speak at the event. Willis's expertise is in research and teaching in adult development and aging. She is the coauthor of numerous books, articles and chapters on topics in her field.
