Coastal Sponsors Academic Bowl

If you are a fan of the television quiz show *Jeopardy*, you may want to attend the Academic Bowl, Friday, April 13 and Saturday, April 14 at the college. Approximately 30 high schools and ten middle schools from Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina will compete during the two-day event.

Free and open to the public, the academic bowl will be held from 1 to 5 p.m. on Friday, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday in the Graduate and Continuing Education Center. Championship play-offs begin at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

The academic bowl is a double-elimination tournament. Matches consist of one round with two teams competing for fifteen minutes. Each match will include toss-up and bonus questions.

A team is made up of four students and up to four alternates. Lower division teams will include middle school students through ninth grade. Upper division teams will include high school students enrolled in the ninth through twelfth grades and adult students currently enrolled in GED programs.

The winning high school team will be awarded a full-tuition scholarship to Coastal, and qualifies for the Texaco Star National Academic Championship.

Coastal Professor Awarded NASA Faculty Fellowship

Dr. Ballou Skinner, professor of physics at Coastal, has been notified by NASA officials that he has been awarded a Faculty Fellowship at the Kennedy Space Center for summer 1990. The fellowship is Dr. Skinner's third NASA fellowship, making him the first faculty member to be awarded three fellowships at KSC. He will conduct abrasion resistance studies for wire insulation materials and electrostatic charge build-up and decay studies for thin plastic materials used in and around the Space Shuttle complex.

In addition to the material science research, Dr. Skinner will spend part of the summer serving as project counselor to the Space Life Sciences Training Program. The purpose of the SLSTP is to attract thirty of the nation's top college students interested in research germane to the NASA field of Space Life Science. The students will gain insight into how space life science flight experiments are conducted as well as explore future research opportunities in the space program. Dr. Skinner and nine students have been assigned to a flight project team of the Bionetics Corporation, whose assignment is to design, test and implement a Sea Urchin Fertilization Flight Project currently manifested to fly in 1992 on STS55, the second mission of the new shuttle, Endeavor. The project will expose the students to the development of the flight project in regard to the hardware design and the pre-flight quality control data collection. Dr. Skinner will assist students in understanding scientific concepts, give guidance on the flight project, and evaluate both students and the program.

Blood Drive Surpasses Goal

A one-day record of blood collection was established at the American Red Cross blood drive held recently at Coastal.

The drive, which was co-sponsored by the Myrtle Beach Jaycees and the Inter-Greek Council at Coastal, attracted 138 possible donors. From this number, 126 pints of blood were collected, which surpassed the goal of 100 pints.

"We had a tremendous turnout from Coastal Carolina students, faculty and staff as well as community members," Duane DaPron, blood drive chairman, said. "The cooperation between various departments of the college and the community helped make this drive a great success."

The drive featured contests for both Coastal Carolina student and non-student groups who donated the most blood during the drive. Winning the student group competition was the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, who received \$100 from SGA. Claiming non-student group honors was Coastal's Student Affairs Office, who will receive a \$100 payment to cover expenses for the office, courtesy of Coastal's senior administration.

Both the student and non-student group winners will also be treated to a pizza party from Domino's Pizza, who also provided pizza for all donors the day of the blood drive.
