Coastal Carolina Theater To Present "South Pacific"

The classic musical theater production South Pacific, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater, Friday, April 20 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances Saturday, April 21 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, April 22 at 2:30 p.m.

Adapted from James A. Michener's Pulitzer Prize winning novel <u>Tales of the South Pacific</u>, the original production with Mary Martin, set box office records in the late 1940s.

According to Charles Whetzel, director of the Coastal production and visiting assistant professor/artist-inresidence, South Pacific will feature the talents of Coastal students, and community singers and actors. "South Pacific combines a little romance, a little social conscience, and a lot of beautiful music," said Whetzel.

The players are James Van Etten as Emile deBeque; Shene Cassagnol as Nellie Forbush; Doris Hudson, Conway High School drama director, as Bloody Mary; Donnie Guyton as Lt. Joseph Cable; Jim Blackburn, assistant professor of French at Coastal, as Captain Brackett; Divina Perez as Liat; Diane and Mary Saunders as the children of deBeque; and Sean Pierce as Luther Billis. Other cast members include Kelley Swaim, Liz Petit, Nina McDuffie, Barbara Krug, Susan Jacobs, Kim Wiant, Laura Holliday, Linda Johnson, Rhett Fowler, Mark Loomis, Ted Detwiler, Lou Nordeen, Michael Matthews, Chad Ayers, Eugene Ho and Destiny Strickland.

South Pacific is based upon an original book by Hammerstein and Joshua Logan, with music for the stage production by Richard Rogers and lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein.

Sports Information Director Selected To Press Operations Team of 1990 Goodwill Games

Duane DaPron, sports information director at Coastal, has been selected as a member of the Press Operations team for the 1990 Goodwill Games, which will be held July 20 -August 5 in Seattle. DaPron will work at the main press center from the games, which will feature more than 2,500 athletes from more than 50 countries competing in 21 sports. 1986 as an attempt to promote international goodwill through world-class athletic competition. The Goodwill Games features a unique format with only the world's top eight athletes and teams being invited to compete in each sport.

Hicks Awarded Fulbright Scholar Award

Dr. Fred Hicks of Myrtle Beach, professor of history, has been awarded a Fulbright Scholarship grant for 1990. Hicks will begin a lecturer/consultantship to the ministry of education in Nicosia, Cyprus in September.

Hicks served as chancellor of Coastal from 1983 to 1985. He has been a professor of history at the college since 1983. Previously he served as president of Wesleyan College, Macon, Georgia, from 1979 to 1983, and executive vice president at Rollins College, Winter Park, Florida, from 1977 to 1979.

The recipient of numerous research grants, Hicks's research interests are in British, French and German military history. He also teaches the course at Coastal on the Vietnam War.

The Fulbright program was established in 1946 under congressional legislation, and introduced by former Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas, and is designed "to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries." Individuals are selected on the basis of academic and professional qualifications, ability, and willingness to share ideas and experiences with people of diverse cultures. More than 23,000 American scholars have participated in the Fulbright program since it began over forty years ago, many of them rising to positions of leadership in government, academia, the media, and the arts.

The Fulbright program is funded and administered by the United States Information Agency under policy guidelines established by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, a presidentially appointed body. Financial support for the program comes from United States congressional appropriations and from the governments of twenty-seven other nations.

Coastal Professor Authors Book

In his new book, Along the Waccamaw, Dr. Randall Wells, associate professor of English and speech, shares his

experience of how two people from far away come to know a place, begin to feel at home there, and learn to love it for their own.

Setting up a home and working in Conway in Horry County, took some getting used to -- the flat landscape, mild winters and six-month-long summers, the ways of a place where people spoke of "folks" rather than "family," a minister was known as a "preacher," and one of the first questions heard upon meeting somebody for the first time was, "What church do you go to?"

Yet as Wells describes it in his book Along the Waccamaw, he and Marjory found themselves liking the way many things were done and thought about in Conway. They began taking part in community activities. The time came when a third, native-born Wells joined the household. The Wells family was putting down roots -- literally, for they had bought a house of their own and had begun planting trees and shrubs.

Along the Waccamaw duplicates the experience that thousands of other Americans have undergone, who in recent years have moved to towns and cities in the South as changing business and economic conditions have created new jobs and opportunities within them. In his book, Wells shares his story of life in an engaging and seldom written about part of the South. He explores the meanings of place, and combines them with the memories of his far off Illinois boyhood.

Wells was born in 1942, and grew up in Glen Ellyn, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago, where he graduated from Glenbard West High School. He attended Maryville College, Tennesee and graduated from the University of Illinois-Urbana.

He holds a master of arts degree from the University of Connecticut and a Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Before moving to Conway in 1974, he lived in Vicksburg and Jackson, Mississippi; Warrenville, Illinois; Laramie, Wyoming; and Storrs, Connecticut.

In 1989, Wells was a lecturer on American literature at Grenoble, France. He and his wife Marjory have two daughters.
