Coastal To Host Regional Math Conference

Coastal will host the regional math conference, "Shaping Math Education for the 21st Century: II," Friday, May 11, from 9:45 to 4 p.m. Individuals who attend the conference should meet at Wheelwright Auditorium between 9 and 9:45 a.m. for registration. The event is free and open to the public.

The conference is a follow-up on a report to the nation by the National Research Council entitled "Everybody Counts." "Everybody Counts" is the beginning of a process through which teachers, state and local authorities, and the varied constituencies of mathematics education can draw together in a sustained revitalization effort.

In response to the report, Dr. Subhash Saxena, professor of mathematics at Coastal, requested and received a grant from the Horry County Higher Education Commission. With the full cooperation of the Department of Mathematics at USC Coastal Carolina College, the Horry County and Georgetown County School Districts, a regional conference was held in the fall of 1989 to complete the "description and discussion" phase of the report.

The follow-up conference will deal with the "prescription" phase of the report. It will deal with specific solutions and strategy for implementation. It is hoped a prototype model will eventually develop as a result of the meeting.

The keynote speaker for the conference will be Dr. Ronald G. Douglas, dean of the Physical Sciences and Mathematics Department and mathematics professor at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Douglas is one of the leaders of the current calculus reform movement and is a member of The National Research Council's Board for Mathematical Sciences and the Committee on the Mathematical in the year 2000.

The conference is organized by the Department of Mathematics of Coastal Carolina College, and is jointly sponsored by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, the Coastal Educational Foundation, the

Horry County and Georgetown County school districts.

Coastal Hosts Philological Conference

Most people who have a love of literature, a thirst for theater, or a passion for poetry, would find it hard to pass up an invitation to discuss their favorite novel, play or poem with someone who shares similar interests.

The Philological Association of the Carolinas, a professional organization of scholars from the areas of literature and linguistics, recently held a conference to do just this -- meet and talk with fellow colleagues, students and other individuals about the topics of literature and more.

Coastal hosted the fourteenth annual conference at the Sheraton Hotel, Myrtle Beach. Dr. Jacqueline Gmuca, assistant professor of English and Dr. Stephen Nagle, associate professor of English, were local arrangements co-chairs for the conference.

According to Gmuca, approximately 200 individuals from as far away as Texas and Massachusetts registered for the three-day event. Coastal Carolina College students also were invited to attend.

Junior English major, Melodie Taylor of Georgetown, was one of the students who decided to accept the invitation of hearing what others had to say about some of her favorite topics.

One of the sessions she attended was on American literature -- "The American Renaissance," chaired by Frank Whaley of Fayetteville State University, Fayetteville, North Carolina.

"What I enjoyed the most about going to the session was the relaxed format," said Taylor. "Everyone was very laid-back while at the same time discussing very in-depth essays. My thoughts were expanded and it made me focus on how to look at things in essays more critically."

Taylor, who plans on writing for a newspaper after graduation, said she appreciated the opportunity to be included in a group of "intellectuals" who were sharing insight on her interests, and that the "intellectuals" treated students on the same level as other participants.

Another Coastal student who decided to challenge his thoughts at the event, was Andrew Wiest of Wilmington, Delaware, a senior English major.

Wiest, who will leave the area this summer for graduate school at Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio, to work on a master's degree in pop culture, says he was impressed by the conference and its participants.

"Every paper I heard that was presented was appreciated," said Wiest. "For example, in the session on Nathaniel Hawthorne, an essay was presented on *The Scarlet Letter*. The subject of mirror imagery was brought up -- something I had never thought of. That's what I enjoyed about the sessions -- learning to look at a piece of writing in new and different ways."

According to Dr. Jack Weaver, 1989-90 president of the group and professor of English/ director of the master of arts program in English at Winthrop College, Rock Hill, the conference held at Myrtle Beach was perhaps the best he has ever seen.

"Attendance was higher than usual and quality of papers and presentations were excellent," said Weaver.

Weaver says he was pleased with the sessions he could attend, in between working behind the scenes. He said this "progress report" type of meeting is highly beneficial for those in the profession to attend.

"It gives everyone the opportunity to meet, gather and share information," he said. "And it is a small enough group that we can compare and share this information on an intimate level."

The Philological Association was founded in 1977 at Winthrop College by Earl Wilcox, Joe Zdenek and Joe Joiner, who gathered scholars from several institutions in the Carolinas for an organizational meeting.

Richard Collin Publishes Article

Dr. Richard Collin, professor of political science, recently had an article entitled "When Reality Came Unglued: Antonio Savasta and the Italian Red Brigades," accepted for publication in *Violence, Aggression and Terrorism*. The article examines the personal and ideological history of a Red Brigades terrorist whom Collin recently interviewed.

Collin has been a writer and analyst of contemporary political affairs for twenty-five years. His graduate studies at Harvard University were interrupted when he was called to active duty from the United States Army, and he spent two years in the Pentagon as a briefing officer, serving under the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence.

When he became a civilian officer for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), Collin was stationed in Rome for five years, serving as Chief of the Intelligence Collection Branch of the DIA station in Italy.

Beside his political novel, *Imbroglia* (which has appeared in five languages), Collin is the author of *The De Lorenzo Gambit: The Italian Coup Manque of 1964*, London Sage, 1976; *Arms and Advisors: Views from Saudi Arabia and Iran* (with A.E. Bayne) New Haven: American Universities Field Staff, 1976; and *La donna che sparo a Mussolini*, Milan: Rusconi, 1988.

With his colleague, Gordon L. Freedman, Collin has just completed a popularized account of the Dozier kidnapping. Entitled, *Winter of Fire: The Abduction of General Dozier and the Fall of the Red Brigades*, it will be released by E.P. Dutton in June 1990.

Collin has been a member of the editorial board of *Violence, Aggression and Terrorism* since 1987. His article, "Breaking the Police: Mussolini's Use of Terrorism," appeared in the first issue of the journal.

Coastal Student Receives Nomination For Harry S. Truman Award

Brendan Frost of Leesburg, Virginia, a sophomore marine science major at Coastal, recently received the honor of being nominated for the Harry S. Truman Award, a scholarship sponsored by the Truman Foundation that is awarded to students who plan to pursue a profession in government.

According to Dr. Jack Riley, assistant professor of government and international studies, Frost was a perfect candidate for the award.

"It is a great honor for Brendan to have been nominated for the award," said Riley. "He is an excellent student and had a good shot at winning the award. He met the requirements of the nomination process completely."

Frost is involved in numerous activities at the Coastal campus. He is a member of the Coastal Carolina Chorus and the South Carolina Student Legislature, serves as vice president of the astrology club, is a participant in campus plays, and is a resident assistant.

Coastal Professors Help Organize Student Project Held At Pavilion

Michael Sloothaak, instructor of physics, and Judy Overcash, science teacher at Myrtle Beach High School and Coastal, recently participated in a class experiment they helped organize with students from Coastal and the high school.

More than 40 students spent an afternoon at the Pavilion measuring the height, speed, acceleration, and potential energy of the rides as part of the physics project.

Sloothaak and Overcash came up with the idea of using the Pavilion rides for experiments from similar projects at larger amusement parks, such as those in the Six Flags chain.

Myrtle Beach Farms, who donated ride tickets so the students could conduct their experiments are interested in the results.
