#### Columbia access numbers change, lines added

To improve telephone capabilities a T1 link has been established between USC Columbia and Coastal. This link increases the number of voice circuits and data transmission speeds between the two campuses. The access code for the Columbia lines have been changed to 51 (replacing 61, 62, 63, and 65).

Faculty and staff are encouraged to use the Columbia lines whenever possible to make all long distance calls. This will save approximately 20 percent of the long distance fees compared to using the Conway lines.

To place a long distance call, dial 51 to access Columbia's switch, then 9 to access a local Columbia line, and then dial 1 plus the number you wish to call.

The access code for the Salkehatchie campus has been changed from 54 to 58. To call Salkehatchie, dial 51 to access the Columbia switch, then dial 58 to access the Salkehatchie switch. You may then dial an extension number or 0 to ring the switchboard.

"Chalk Talk Revised" with Father Martin is the seminal film on the disease of alcoholism by one of the most well-known and wellrespected educators in the field. Originally entitled "Chalk Talk on Alcohol," the film was made for the U.S. Navy in 1972. It is considered the principal educational vehicle on the subject of alcoholism by the armed services, industry, medical facilities, and treatment centers. It is as accurate today as when it was first produced. The film is an entertaining look at a very serious subject and is appropriate for all audiences.

#### Coastal hosts Central American students

Coastal is hosting a group of eight students from Central America beginning this month. The Central American Scholarship Program (CASP) has chosen this group of highly motivated young men and women, between the ages of 21 and 25, to study in the United States. After having spent the spring semester at USC Columbia receiving English instruction, these students will spend the 18 months at Coastal taking courses that will prepare them to operate businesses when they return home.

Part of their visit in the U.S. includes living experiences with

American families. Coastal's international program is looking for families, particularly in the Quail Creek and College Park areas, who would be interested in sharing their homes with one or more of these students for six months. The program has funds available to compensate host families for additional expenses they incur. After the six-month host family experience, students will move into student housing or make other arrangements for the remainder of their stay.
