International substance abuse expert to speak on campus Sept. 10

Dr. N. Peter Johnson, an internationally recognized expert in the field of substance abuse, will present a lecture Monday, September 10, at 6:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

His presentation "The New Wave of Drugs in South Carolina" will cover drugs such as ice, crank, and crack. The program is sponsored by the athletic department and is free and open to students, faculty, and staff.

Dr. Johnson is a research associate professor and coordinator of the Office of Alcohol and Drug Studies, Department of Neuropsychiatry and Behavioral Science at the USC School of Medicine. He also is the director of the Wellness Program for the Department of Athletics at USC.

Johnson has an easy-going manner and speaks understandably to all levels. A question and answer period will follow his presentation.

Baxley named dean of Wall School of Business Administration and Computer Science

William J. Baxley Jr. has been named dean of the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration and Computer Science.

Baxley has been associate chancellor for college advancement since 1977. In July 1989, he was named interim dean and continued to serve in both capacities until his appointment as dean was announced last week.

Chancellor Ron Eaglin said that he chose Baxley because of his extensive administrative experience and the close association he has had with the school of business as an adjunct faculty member and as one of the college's chief administrative officers.

"We are pleased that Bill has become the first dean of the E. Craig Wall School of Business," said Eaglin. "He is a veteran administrator who has seen the school of business grow and develop over the last decade. He understands its needs in terms of academic responsibilities and in terms of administrative leadership. I know he will be a guiding force as the school of business gains an increasing presence in the Southeast during the 1990s."

One of Baxley's immediate objectives is to work with administrators, architects and contractors on the new Wall Building.

"With ground-breaking set for this fall, we have a major task ahead of us," Baxley said. "This will be one of the most impressive academic structures in the Southeast, and part of our responsibility will be to insure that it is a state-of-the-art facility that meets the specific needs of our business and computer science students."

Partnership with the regional business community is another item that is high on the new dean's list of priorities. The school's Center for Economic Development has been in operation for 1 1/2 years and has already been actively involved in providing technical assistance and research for businesses and local government. Baxley sees this involvement increasing substantially in the coming years.

"The Center for Economic Development functions as a bridge between the college and the community, drawing on the unique talents and expertise of faculty and students to serve economic and community needs," said Baxley. "We hope to provide services and information that will assist various segments of our community in making sound decisions about the economic development of this region." ∞

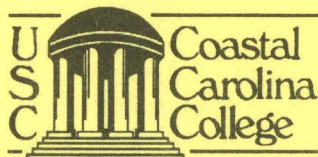
