Coastal to host public forum on beach erosion

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies is hosting a public forum on beach erosion, Wednesday, September 26, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at the Myrtle Beach Martinique Hotel.

The forum, Past, Present and Future Impacts to the Grand Strand, is open to the public at no charge.

The program is the first of the center's four-part series of forums on environmental issues. Included on the beach erosion panel are Orrin Pilkey of Duke University, Tim Kana of the consulting firm Coastal Science and Engineering. Robert Van Dolah of the South Carolina Department of Wildlife and Marine Resources, Bill Eiser of the South Carolina Coastal Council. and Richard Jackson of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The forum will be moderated by Paul Gayes, director of Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies.

Other public forums in the series scheduled this fall are: Dredging Issues on Thursday, October 11; Coastal Pollution on Thursday, October 25; and Wetland Issues on Thursday, November 8.

The Kellogg program began in 1980 to help the nation expand its pool of capable leaders. It is structured to increase participants' skills and insights into areas outside their chosen disciplines so they can deal more creatively and effectively with society's complex problems.
