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

Greenpeace Cofounder to speak on campus

Rex Weyler, co-founder of Greenpeace, will speak at Coastal Wednesday, Sept. 19 at 7:30 p.m. in the Graduate and Continuing Education Little Theater.

Wevler will lecture on the interrelatedness of the natural world and will discuss the early years of Greenpeace. The lecture is free and open to the public. Weyler also will speak to Coastal students on Wednesday, Sept. 19 at 4 p.m. in Science Building 106.

Weyler is a writer, photographer, journalist, and editor. In 1975, he became a director of the Greenpeace Foundation and sailed on the first Greenpeace voyage that confronted Soviet whalers in the Pacific.

He is the author of Blood of the Land, a history of the American Indian movement and Song of the Whale, the early history of Greenpeace and a study of whale intelligence.

The Weyler lecture is the first in what is hoped will be an annual series of presentations called the Homeland Lectures and Dialogues. The series serves to inspire and promote bioregional consciousness in the Waccamaw, Pee Dee and Grand Strand regions. Bioregionalism relates to the interconnectedness of all creation; the sanctity of life, human and nonhuman; and the unity of the natural world with the human mind.

The Weyler lecture is cosponsored by Aynor-based Blackwater Partnership of Horry County and Coastal's department of biology. For more information, call Colleen Lohr, extension 2204.∞

Collegiate anglers chased by Hugo to try again

In the first 15 years of the Coastal Carolina Invitational, the world's oldest intercollegiate fishing match and seminar, only one day of offshore fishing was weathered out. That changed last September as student anglers from Canada, the Ivy League and the Carolinas had to get out of Myrtle Beach just ahead of Hurricane Hugo.

The collegians will be back in town Sept. 19 through 21, with hopes of better weather and good fishing out of Little River and Murrells Inlet for the 17th Annual Coastal Carolina Invitational.

Last year it was sort of a "last breakfast" the teams had on the morning of Sept. 21 at Springmaid Pier. Before the next morning, Springmaid Pier would have been destroyed, along with all the other piers of South Carolina's Grand Strand.

"I told the teams from Yale and Western Ontario University to drive out through North Myrtle Beach and when I saw the traffic going through Conway that afternoon, I was glad of that choice," said tournament founder and director Donald Millus.

College students from Coastal, Clemson, Francis Marion, UNC-Wilmington, Southwestern (Kansas), Western Ontario and Yale will be fishing one day out of Little River one day out of Murrells Inlet.

Coastal professor Richard Moore will present a slide show and lecture about gamefish of Coastal Carolina waters on Wednesday, Sept. 19 at 8 p.m. Moore is the author of Fishes of the Gulf of Mexico.

Don Hammond of the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department will give a presentation on the state's tagging program Thursday, Sept. 20 at 8 p.m. According to Millus, student anglers in the tournament tagged and released 57 live king mackerel during one of the previous tournaments.

The Coastal Carolina Invitational has attracted many interesting visitors over the years, including Hal Lyman, founder of Salt Water Sportsman; Nelson Bryant, the outdoor writer for the New York Times; George Reiger, conservation columnist for Field and Stream; and South Carolina Governor Carroll Campbell, who is an avid big-game angler. ∞

In Walkabout, Director Nicholas Roeg explores the contrasts between civilized and natural life when tragedy erupts after an attraction forms between the aborigine and the girl.

Steve Nagle and **Sara Sanders** have been nominated to the editorial review board of the *SECOL Review*, the journal of the Southeastern Conference on Linguistics. They will review articles submitted for publication in the journal.

Richard Collin recently appeared on the WBTW TV-13 noon news program "Daywatch" to discuss the hostage situation in Iraq.

Paul Rice's article, "Henry Washington Bellamy: Poetry and the Poet in the 19th Century Appalachia," was published in the most recent issue of *Appalachian Heritage*, a scholarly magazine dealing with Southern Appalachian life and culture. Bellamy was a mountain minister and poet born in Tennessee in 1848.

Collin publishes Winter of Fire

Winter of Fire, a book by Richard Oliver Collin and Gordon L. Freedman, has been published recently by E.P. Dutton, a subsidiary of Penguin America.

Written for the general reader, Winter of Fire is the factual account of the celebrated kidnapping of American Army General James Dozier at the hands of the Italian Red Brigades.

The story is told from the perspective of the three principal characters in this real-life drama: Dozier; Antonio Savasta, the last military commander of the Red Brigades; and Rino Genova, the tough, intellectual cop who solved the case. In rescuing Dozier and arresting Savasta, the Italian police began the process of rolling up the largest terrorist organization in Western Europe.

In addition to being a political narrative, *Winter of Fire* also recounts a series of love stories; the tragically ill-fated liaison between Antonio Savasta and a female urban guerrilla counter-points with

Based on actual interviews with police and intelligence officers, the Dozier family, and the terrorists who tormented them, *Winter of Fire* is written in a fast-flowing dramatic style.

National Public Radio senior commentator Daniel Schorr has called *Winter of Fire* "a haunting and dramatic account of the world on international terrorism."

Oliver Stone, director of Platoon, El Salvador, and Born on the Fourth of July, has described the book as exciting and authentic. "Rarely have I seen exacting research and narrative skill combined with such a spectacular result," Stone said.

The book was conceived by Gordon L. Freedman, a Los Angeles TV and film producer, who did the preliminary research and helped edit the manuscript. Further research and interviews in Washington, D.C. and Italy were done by Collin, who then wrote the text. ∞
