# CEF and HCHEC hire consultants to study Coastal-USC relationship

The Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. and the Horry County Higher Education Commission announced Friday that they have retained three consultants to study the relationship between Coastal Carolina College and the University of South Carolina.

The decision to hire the consultants follows a one and one-half year study conducted by an ad hoc committee of foundation and commission members which examined the financial and historical evolution of Coastal Carolina College. The committee's report focused on these issues and on the legal relationship between Coastal and the university.

According to commission chairman Robert Rabon, the contract between the commission and the university for the operation of

## Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra to perform in Wheelwright

The Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra will perform Thursday, Oct. 25 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

The 13-member ensemble will perform Britten's Simple Symphony, Shostakovick's Sinfonietta from Quantet #8, Mozart's Divertimento in D Major and Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings in C Major.

In its 1979 debut season, the orchestra gave seven performances at Carnegie Hall, appeared at Lincoln Center's Avery Fisher Hall, Philadelphia's Academy of Music, Princeton's McCarter Theater and in Washington D.C. Each concert drew capacity audiences and consistently inspired rave reviews and standing ovations.

The success of the Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra has spanned three continents. A widely acclaimed South American tour in 1982 led to return trips in 1984 and 1986. The group's European debut took place in 1983, and in 1984 the orchestra returned to full houses in Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, England, Italy, Germany and Holland.

Maestro Lazar Gosman is the founder and music director of the Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra. A full-length documentary film, Musical Passage, released in April 1984, tells the story of how Gosman came to America from his native Soviet Union and founded the orchestra. The documentary provides insight into the experience of Soviet emigrants as the film follows the group on tour throughout America, culminating in its triumphant Carnegie Hall concert.

Gosman is professor of violin and chamber music at the State University of New York at Stonybrook, and music director of the St. Louis Kammerguild. He also is founder of the Leningrad Chamber Orchestra and led the group for 17 years.

Tickets for the concert are \$20 or \$10 for students, and are available at Wheelwright Box Office. ∞

## Public forum on Coastal pollution to be held Thursday

Coastal is hosting a public forum on Coastal pollution on Thursday, Oct. 25 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at the Myrtle Beach Martinique Hotel, 7100 North Ocean Boulevard.

The forum, "Risk Assessment in Setting Environmental Pollution Standards," is open to the public at

no charge.

As the third of Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies four-part Fall Forum on Environmental Issues, the public forum on Coastal pollution will feature professionals who will serve as panelists. Included on the panel are Eric Koepfler and Susan Libes, both of Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies: Thomas Matthews of the S.C. Department of Wildlife and Marine Resources; Russ Shearer of the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control; and Andrew Fairey of the Charleston Commission of Public Works. The forum will be moderated by Paul Gayes, the director of Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies.

Coastal has not been changed since 1975. "Our report points out," said Rabon, "that although our contract remains the same, there have been dramatic changes in both institutions. During the 1980s, Coastal became the fastest-growing college in the state and there have been positive changes in academics and administration at both institutions. We simply are not operating under the terms of the original contract, and we felt that a third party should conduct an in-depth study of the relationship and make sound recommendations for the future."

Foundation president Paul Malone said that the ad hoc committee felt further study was required to determine if the contract reflected the current needs of both institutions. "We noted," said Malone, "that the per student funding of Coastal is by far the lowest in the state, and the capital plant to support the educational program is the lowest of any other state institution at 99 square feet per student."

Malone said that the relationship between the university and Coastal has been positive since its beginning in 1960. "USC helped to guide the college from its infancy through the period as a two-year college and through the time when it became a four-year institution in

1975. However, the relationship that has evolved over the years is quite different from the contractual agreement of 1975. We felt an objective third party would be able to make the best evaluation and offer recommendations that would be in the best interest of the residents of Horry County.'

Coastal Carolina College was founded in 1954 by the Coastal Educational Foundation, a group of local community leaders and educators who believed there was a need for a local college with affordable tuition. The college was supported with private funds until 1959, when Horry County residents approved a referendum which raised taxes by three mills to support the institution. In 1960, the General Assembly created the commission to manage these public funds. Initially, the foundation served as the commission, but later the two groups became independent. The foundation now focuses on private fund raising for capital projects and academic support, and the commission manages local tax dollars used for similar purposes. Since 1960, when Coastal became part of the USC system, the commission has been the agency that contracts with the university to provide higher

education opportunity in Horry County at Coastal Carolina College. The last time a contract was negotiated was in 1975.

The intention of the foundation and commission, Malone said, is to develop an authoritative statement about the future of Coastal Carolina College. After 15 years, the relationship needs to be re-evaluated and thoroughly studied, impartially and with the full cooperation of the Board of Trustees and the administration of the university. From Oct. 22 - 26, the consultants will interview Coastal faculty, administrators and students; USC trustees and administrators; and community leaders.

Members of the team are chairman E. K. Fretwell, chancellor emeritus of UNC Charlotte and former president of the State University College at Buffalo; Harold Enarson, chancellor emeritus of Ohio State University and former executive director of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education; and J. Wade Gilley, senior vice president of George Mason University of Virginia and former secretary of education for the Commonwealth of Virginia. Their final report to the commission and foundation is expected in late November. ∞

## Gayes and Nelson to present Hugo research at national meeting

Professors Paul Gayes and Douglas Nelson will present their research papers on Hurricane Hugo at the annual convention of the Geological Society of America in Dallas set to begin Sunday, Oct. 28.

Gayes will present "Hurricane Hugo Impacts on the Nearshore Region of South Carolina."

Gayes has used a sonar survey and limited diver observations to assess the passage of Hugo through the state. His research shows extensive hurricane related debris in the ocean adjacent to most developed areas of the coast. Gayes also has found that adjacent to heavily developed beaches, sand deposits appear to be strongly correlated with public access and openings between large oceanfront structures. The research suggests an interaction between nearshore dynamics and existing development during the storm.

Nelson will present "Local Factors Effecting Hurricane Hugo Beach Erosion."

Nelson's research suggests the local factors effecting the nature of beach erosion from Hugo are storm tide elevation, beach sand grain size, beach elevation, local shoreline bends and buildings. According to Nelson's work, erosion was not increased during Hugo in front of seawalls or riprap revetments. ∞
