Zindel's adult comedy, And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little, was first produced to critical acclaim in New York in 1971. On the surface, the play presents a harmless dinner party between three grown sisters and various neighbors. But appearances can be deceiving: Catherine drinks a little, Ceil hasn't been around in more than eight months, and Anna worries that she has rabies. For 25 years, Guy Carawan has performed his repertoire of traditional Southern music as well as contemporary songs with a Southern slant. His performing career parallels 25 years of important cultural work in the South, based at the Highlander Center in Tennessee. Carawan has 13 recordings and 15 documentaries dealing with Appalachia and black Southern cultures as

well as with the music of China.

As a husband and wife team, Guy and Candie Carawan have studied and performed the folk music of the South Carolina Lowcountry as well as that of the Appalachians. They used to live on Johns Island, near Charleston. The Carawans have performed on educational television and have written a book, Ain't You Got a Right to the Tree of Life? - an oral history of Johns Island life.
