Education is hosting a public discussion featuring vice consulate general of Israel, David Akov. The discussion, relating to the explosive Middle East, will be held on Sunday, Nov. 18, at 3:30 p.m. in GCEC 003. The discussion is open to the public at no charge. Richard Collin will moderate.

A native of Israel, Akov was born in Tel Aviv in 1960 and grew up in Rechovot. Akov has lived in the United States with his family on two occasions while his parents were on sabbatical. In 1977, during the second of his family's sabbaticals, Akov was graduated from high school in Raleigh, N.C.

military service in 1981, Akov entered Hebrew University in Jerusalem and was graduated in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in Middle Eastern studies and political science.

In 1985, Akov joined the Israeli Foreign Ministry, where he worked in the Asian Division, the Information Department, and most recently, at the Iranian Desk of the Foreign Ministry's Research Department.

Akov received his master's degree in political science from Hebrew University in 1989. He was appointed to the Israeli Consulate in Atlanta, beginning his current post in July 1989.

Akov lives in Atlanta with his wife, Tamar.


