Coastal business student is AT&T Challenge leader

One of the first things Daniel Sullivan did last Monday morning was get his hands on *USA Today*. For the Coastal senior, the news was good — Sullivan was listed in the number 10 slot for college students in the AT&T Challenge, a national investment competition. Sullivan was listed as first in the nation last week, a spot he held for four days.

USA Today lists the top 10 college students, high school students, colleges, high schools and

educators in the AT&T Challenge each Monday until the competition ends Feb. 28. More than 11,000 students and educators are entered in the third AT&T Challenge. This is Coastal's second year in the competition.

When the contest began Nov. 1, participants were issued a \$500,000 fictitious account. The object of the AT&T Challenge is to buy and sell any of 4,500 stocks in an attempt to

Michie publishes book on Richmond Hill Plantation

Richmond Hill Plantation 1810-1868, a book by James Michie, has been published by The Reprint Company of Spartanburg, S.C.

The book, subtitled The Discovery of Antebellum Life on a Waccamaw Rice Plantation, is based on Michie's work unearthing Richmond Hill, an antebellum plantation in the Waccamaw Neck. The rice plantation had collapsed in the aftermath of the Civil War.

From 1983 to 1988, the South Carolina Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology of the University of South Carolina conducted a series of investigations that led to the rediscovery of Richmond Hill. Today, Richmond Hill is part of the Wachesaw Plantation development.

Not only is Michie's book an historical account of plantation life, it is a critical analysis of more than 16,000 artifacts unearthed on the site. Beyond the artifacts, the book deals with the reconstruction of houses and an investigation of a slave cemetery.

Michie is associate director of the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies and cofounder of the Archaeological Society of South Carolina, Inc. ∞

maximize the value of the account. The player with the highest portfolio value at the close of trading on Feb. 28 will be declared the winner — and will win \$25.000.

Sullivan's account is valued at \$597,035 after a week and a half of the competition.

Gerald Boyles said the twocredit course gives the 60 students in the class an inexpensive and handson opportunity to learn what the stock market is all about.

As for Sullivan topping the list in the nation for four days last week, Boyles said, "For him to be number one in the nation is just unbelievable—especially when you consider all the major schools in the country are competing in this and when you recognize the quality of the schools in there. It's quite an achievement."

But according to Sullivan, a finance major who is less than six weeks from graduation, "It's an easy game."

With at least three calls a day to the AT&T Challenge brokers, Sullivan said he is continually aware of what the market is doing.

"I spend three or four hours a day on this, whether it's looking at options or seeing what the market is doing. Any piece of news may tell you something. You have to do a scenario analysis. And you have to trust your judgement and listen to yourself, Sullivan said.

"But who knows, the Giants winning last night could be just as much a factor as anything else," Sullivan said. "A lot of it is just luck."∞

Preston McKever-Floyd and Joseph Appiah were presenters at the conference Sub-Saharan Africa—Selected Topics Relating to the History, Politics, Economics, Sociology and Culture of a Continent held at Benedict College in Columbia Nov. 5 and 6.

McKever-Floyd presented The Aldura Movement: A Study of West African Religion, Politics and Social Change and Joseph Appiah presented Trade, European Influence and the Colonial transformation of Ghana: 1400-1929.

The two-day event hosted speakers from the Curriculum Enrichment Program's consortium of nine predominantly black two- and four-year institutions, the College of Charleston and the Visiting Fulbright Lecturer program.


