Dame named Palmetto Professor for second year

Professor Richard Dame, chair of the marine science department, has been named Coastal's Palmetto Professor for the second consecutive year. The professorship is funded through an endowment created by a \$50,000 Cutting Edge grant from the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education and a \$50,000 grant from the Coastal Educational Foundation.

According to Ron Ingle, the professorship was established to attract and retain outstanding faculty who are making or who show promise of making substantial contributions to the college through teaching, scholarship and/or creative work.

"Dr. Dame's second appointment as Palmetto Professor reinforces his outstanding accomplishments as a teacher, scholar and mentor," said Ingle. "There is an accompanying recognition of the contributions of Dame's marine science colleagues. The marine science faculty has established an exemplary record of teaching and scholarship."

Candidates for the professorship must hold the rank of tenured professor. External candidates, if the chancellor and vice chancellor for academic affairs decide to accept their nominations, must meet all requirements for appointment as a tenured professor.

Dame is the author of more than 40 published, science-related articles. He has been the recipient of more than 15 grants since 1973.

He has conducted research with the Belle W. Baruch Institute for Marine Biology and Research as a research associate; The Institute of Ecology at the University of Georgia as a research associate; and the Rijkesinstituut for Nature Management in Texel, The Netherlands, as an invited scientist.

Dame has served as a consultant for the United States Department of Justice, the Cherry Grove Property Owners, the South Carolina Coastal Council, the Litchfield Beaches Property Owners and the Smithsonian Institution.

He has taught science since 1966, joining the Coastal faculty in 1971 as professor and chairman of Marine Science. He has led the program to its stature as one of the three most sought after undergraduate marine science programs in the country.

In 1985, 1987 and 1989, Dame taught coral reef ecology at Discovery Bay, Jamaica, in the West Indies. ~
