Congratulations to **Danielle and Eric Eiler** on the birth of their son, Corbin Reed, on Dec. 18.

Fred Hicks has written a biographical essay on the career of Field Marshal Albert Kesselring. The essay is part of the Salem Press 1990 edition of *Great Lives from History: Twentieth Century*. Kesselring was instrumental in establishing the German Air Force during World War II. He was an effective military commander for Hitler in his role as commander in chief of German armed forces in the southern region during the 1943-1944 Italian campaign. Hicks has research interests in German, French, British military history, and the American experience in Vietnam.

Paul T. Gayes has received a grant and has recently returned from a research cruise with the Department of Oceanography at Florida Institute of Technology. Gayes conducted a

high resolution continuous seismic reflection survey of the Indian River Lagoon area near Melbourne, Florida. This project will outline the geologic framework of the lagoon system and identify surficial sediment thicknesses within the Intracostal Waterway and Indian River Estuary. The project is similar to ongoing work by the Center of Marine and Wetland Studies at Murrells Inlet. Coastal Marine Science senior Neal Gielstra participated and assisted Gayes on the research cruise.

Karen D. Carpenter's feature article, *Oxygen Transportation in the Blood*, has been accepted for publication in *Critical Care Nurse*, the foremost journal of clinical excellence in critical care nursing. Carpenter is on the board of directors for Grand Strand Chapter of the American Association of Critical Care Nursing. Her articles appear in numerous nursing journals. ~



Emergency Closing Information 1991

Faculty and staff are asked to clip and save this information for future reference. (It has been suggested that faculty keep this sheet in their roll books so they can remind students about the policy if threatening conditions are predicted.)

When inclement weather or other emergency conditions arise, the college may cancel classes. In this event, employees are expected to report to work. The college will remain open unless the governor closes state offices, which means the college will be closed for both students and employees. If employees are unable to report to work when classes have been canceled, they should contact their immediate supervisors to make arrangements for taking annual leave or compensatory time. Employees who do not report to work or who report late shall use accrued annual or compensatory leave to make up time lost, take leave without pay, or be allowed

to make up time lost from work at a time to be scheduled by the university. The employee must be given the option of making up time lost from work if desired. Employees are not expected to risk dangerous traveling conditions to report for work. Announcements will be made as follows:

Classes canceled: Students do not report; employees do report unless they are experiencing problems, in which case they should contact their immediate supervisors. Please be mindful that the switchboard is likely to be overloaded at this time, so call only if necessary.

College Closed: The governor has closed all state offices; students and employees do not report

Note: Since Coastal Carolina College is a state agency, the college closings **may not coincide** with public school closings.
