## Marine scientist spends sabbatical teaching and researching at Coastal

David Scott is spending the spring 1991 semester at Coastal in the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies as an adjunct faculty member.

Scott is on sabbatical from the Centre for Marine Geology, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia. He earned his Ph.D. in geology from Dalhousie University in 1977.

With Paul Gayes and Douglas Nelson, Scott will study relative sea level changes along the South Carolina coast. He also will teach a class in global change in the Center for Marine Science and Wetland Studies.

Scott has published more than 60 scientific papers and is an associate

editor of the *Journal of Formainiferal Research*. He is the Canadian national correspondent and a member of the International Board of Experts to the International Geologic Correlation Program. Scott also has organized and served as director for two NATO Advanced Studies Institute meetings.

Scott spent the first half of his sabbatical year at Tohoku University in Sendai, Japan.

Scott and Coastal professors Gayes, Nelson and Amy Nelson will present the result of their collaboration at the Geologic Society of America meeting in Baltimore in March. ~

## Coastal Carolina People

Richard Oliver Collin has published "When Irish Eyes Stop Smiling: Martin McGuiness of the Irish Republican Movement" in *International Counter-terrorism and Security*, Winter 1990-91. This article, an interview with a senior IRA personality, has been selected for republication this spring in *Violence and Terrorism*, published by the Dushkin "Annual Editions" Publishing Group. Also selected for inclusion in *Violence and Terrorism* is "Reality Unglued: Antonio Savasta and the Red Brigades" a 1990 Collin article published in *Violence Aggression and Terrorism*. The most recent issue of the *American Historical Review* contains a review article by Richard

Collin entitled "James Walston's The Mafia and Clientelism: Roads to Rome in Post-War Calabria."

Fred Hicks has written a biographical essay on the life and times of Marshal Joseph Joffre. Joffre was the chief of staff of the French Armies facing the forces of Germany in August of 1914. His armies halted the German tide at the First Battle of the Marne, and his actions between Aug. 25 and Sept. 5 enabled other commanders to blunt, disrupt, and eventually turn back the invading Germans. The essay appears in the 1990 Salem Press edition of *Great Lives: Twentieth Century*. Hicks has research interests in British, French, and German military history, and the military history of America in Vietnam. ~

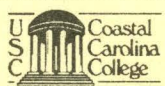
## Homecoming King and Queen crowned
