# Memo from the Chancellor

To: Cost center directors, faculty, and staff

Most of you are now aware through the news media that the state has mandated major budget cuts for the current fiscal year. In addition to the reductions which were made at the beginning of the funding year by CHE and the Budget and Control Board, the most recent cut of \$178,515 amounts to a total of \$563,141 in budget reductions which Coastal has suffered for the 1990-1991 fiscal year. Because of the prudent management which each of you has exercised with your own funds, and because of our overall campus strategic planning and foresight for such a contingency, it appears that we will be able to

# Three new founders inducted

Conway residents Dr. Edward L. Proctor and Evelyn Snider and the late T. Luke Benson were honored during the fifth annual Founders Day Convocation Monday, Feb. 25 at 4 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Edward Proctor was born July 3, 1925 in Conway. He graduated from Clemson University and the Medical University of South Carolina and practiced as a general surgeon in

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implement these budget reductions with no personnel reductions, and with no further spending cuts beyond the 10 percent reduction already requested of you for non-salary budget items.

The implementation of this reduction may appear to be easily achieved, but it has actually been possible because we have all chosen to impose upon ourselves a year of extreme fiscal stringency in anticipation of such a crisis. Although the outlook for equipment purchases is indeed gloomy, we ask that you continue to compile your prioritized lists of equipment requests and submit these requests in the same time frame requested earlier. We are attempting to identify a small amount of non-"A" funds to be used for some of the most crucial equipment needs.

We appreciate greatly your past and continued cooperation in budget management. This has allowed Coastal to deal with the latest crisis much more effectively than many of its peer institutions.

# Coastal Theater to present murder mystery

The Mousetrap, a murder mystery by Agatha Christie, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater Friday, March 1 at 8 p.m.; Saturday, March 2 at 8 p.m.; and Sunday, March 3 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Directed by Ken Parks, The Mousetrap is the longest running production in the history of theater. Produced for the first time in London in 1952, the play is set in an era when "comfortable homes, technology and the daily routine formed a kind of insulation from the evil afoot in the world," Parks said.

Admission is \$7 and student tickets are \$4. Tickets are available from the Wheelwright Box Office Monday through Friday, from noon to 5 p.m.

Conway from 1952 until his retirement in 1989. Proctor also is a retired colonel from the South Carolina National Guard. He has been a long-time friend of Coastal, having served as a director of the Coastal Educational Foundation for more than 20 years.

Evelyn Snider was born Aug. 23, 1907, also in Conway. A graduate of Burroughs High School, she earned a bachelor's degree in English and history at Coker College and a master's degree in English at UNC-Chapel Hill. She taught at Campbell Junior College until 1941 when she returned to Horry County to teach world history, American history, English, and Bible at Conway High School. Snider retired from teaching in 1972. She received Coastal

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Carolina College's Lifetime Achievement Award in Education in 1990.

"Luke" Benson was born Sept. 17, 1917 in Hartsville. A graduate of the University of South Carolina and the Banking School of the South at Louisiana State University, Benson became affiliated with Conway National Bank in 1945. He was elected chairman of the board in 1985 after serving as president since 1965. He was a member of the University of South Carolina Board of Trustees from 1963 to 1984, and a member of the Coastal Educational Foundation from 1973 to 1985. Benson died Oct. 19, 1985.

Earle E. Morris Jr., South Carolina Comptroller General, gave the Convocation address.

### **Open Book Series continues**

Sally Z. Hare will present "Some Leaders are Born Women" Thursday, Feb. 28 at 7 p.m., as part of the Waccamaw Regional Studies Center five-part "Open Book Series." The programs will be held in GCEC-003 and are free and open to the public.

Gerald Groves, professor of English, opened the series Tuesday, Feb. 19 with "Teaching: A Lower Job in Higher Education?"

The series features Coastal faculty and administrators who will share their careers and lives in higher education — their best and worst moments, their rewarding experiences, and what made them devote their lives to higher education.

Hare was the first woman to receive full professor rank at Coastal. She also has held the position of associate vice chancellor for academic affairs at Coastal. As a public school teacher, Hare taught in Columbia, S.C. In 1989, she received the Outstanding Continuing Educator in South Carolina award from the State Association for Higher Continuing Education.

As one of 49 Americans to be selected for the Kellogg National Fellowship Program, Hare received a three-year \$35,000 grant from the Kellogg Foundation to fund her selfdesigned plan of study. The Kellogg program began in 1980 to help the nation expand its pool of capable leaders.

In 1983, Hare organized the annual South Carolina Conference of Women, an ongoing event that drew more than 600 participants in 1989.

The lecture series continues on Monday, March 11 with Roy Talbert Jr. presenting "From Bible Belt to Academe: A Personal Journey;" on Thursday, March 21 Sally M. Horner will present "From Tobacco Farm, to Chemistry Lab, to Executive Office;" and on Tuesday, April 16, "Sex, Lies and Political Science" will be presented by Richard O. Collin.

A slide presentation based on Michie's work at Richmond Hill Plantation was followed by a trip to Laurel Hill Plantation where a rice mill chimney, Civil War Gun emplacement, and a live oak avenue was seen and interpreted. Michie also conducted a public seminar at Bellefield Nature Center, entitled The Excavations of Richmond Hill Plantation, Feb. 6. The presentation discussed the artifacts and remains of plantation buildings that were uncovered and what they tell us about the lives of the people who lived there.

John Farrelly, Tom Cooke, and 10 students, who are physical education and recreation majors, attended the Southern District Conference for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance, held in Norfolk, Va., Feb. 14 to 17.
