# Chanticleers make sports history

Coastal Carolina's basketball team made sports history for the college Wednesday evening when they defeated the Jackson State Tigers before a nationwide television audience on ESPN.

The 78-59 victory places Coastal in the final 64 teams for the NCAA Tournament.

More than 150 fans greeted Coach Bergman and his team when they returned to Myrtle Beach Jet Port Thursday afternoon. When asked about the upcoming tournament Bergman said, "We'll go wherever the selection committee sends us. We're just happy to be there."

Pairings for the first round of the NCAA Tournament will be announced Sunday, March 10 at 6:30 p.m. on CBS.

#### Coastal wins nationwide AT&T Challenge

USC Coastal Carolina College has topped the nation at the close of the AT&T Collegiate Investment Challenge, a national investment competition lasting from November to February. Coastal finished above such schools as Boston University, University of Virginia, Loyola University-Chicago and University of Colorado.

USA Today has listed the top 10 college students, high school students, colleges, high schools, and educators in the AT&T Challenge each Monday until the close of the competition Feb. 28. The final tally was printed in the March 6 edition of the newspaper.

More than 11,000 college students entered the third AT&T Challenge. This is Coastal's second year in the

competition.

At the start of the contest, participants are issued a \$500,000 fictitious account. The object of the AT&T Challenge is to buy and sell any of 4,500 stocks in an attempt to maximize the value of the account. The player with the highest portfolio value at the close of trading on Feb. 28 is declared the winner — and will win \$25,000.

Coastal senior Jay Beck has finished the investment game ranked eighth in the college student division. His portfolio more than doubled during the competition, to finish at \$1,263,562. Beck will receive a \$2,000 cash scholarship and week's vacation for two in the Bahamas. He is a finance major from Marcellus, N.Y.

Coastal business administration professor Gerald Boyles said the two-credit course gives the 55 students in the class an inexpensive and handson opportunity to learn what the stock market is all about. Four Coastal faculty members also competed.

Merrill Lynch is hosting a reception Tuesday, March 12 at 4 p.m. in Myrtle Beach for all of the students who competed in the AT&T Challenge. A plaque will be presented to the group from the Wall Street Games sponsors during Business Week.

Boyles said at least five Coastal students will be ranked in the top 250 college students. He expects to have the official results in the next two

weeks.

### Coastal presents one-man tribute to Faulkner

Oh, Mr. Faulkner, Do You Write?, John Maxwell's one-man show on Southern literary master William Faulkner, will be presented Tuesday, March 12 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

From Mississippi — where
Faulkner lived and worked — comes
Maxwell's show based on the life and
words of one of America's greatest
literary masters. From letters,
speeches and personal recollections of
Mississippians who knew the Nobel
Prize-winning author, Maxwell
characterizes the author, raconteur,
curmudgeon and fiercely independent
Southerner. Critics have called the
performance "a perfect blend of
literature and theater; of reason and
emotion; of the heart and of the mind."

A native of Pickens, Miss., Maxwell is a theater graduate of the University

of Mississippi in Oxford, the college town where Faulkner lived and worked. One of the first people to hear an early draft of *Oh, Mr. Faulkner, Do You Write?* in the early 1980s was Eudora Welty, the Pulitzer Prizewinning Southern author. She said, "The carefully prepared and sensitive script and John Maxwell's warm, serious and well-rounded performance gives us William Faulkner the man in a rewarding evening of theater."

In addition to the performance, Maxwell will conduct a series of workshops for English and theater students Tuesday afternoon.

The program is made possible, in part, by a grant from Alternate ROOTS and the National Endowment for the Arts Theatre Program.

Admission is \$8, and student tickets are \$4.

#### Coastal to hold Business Week and Economic Conference

USC Coastal will hold the sixth annual Business Week, *Preparing for a Changing Future*, Monday, March 18 to Thursday, March 21, with a series of free programs and lectures open to students, faculty, alumni and the

public.

The program includes on-campus presentations of topical issues by local, national and international business leaders concluding with the Economic Conference at the Waccamaw House in Litchfield. The speakers, representing some of the world's largest and most successful enterprises, will share their views on such subjects as the impact of deregulation, the dilemma facing the banking industry, an economic forecast for Horry and Georgetown counties, funding of real estate development projects, strategies for obtaining improved airline service, and productivity improvement techniques.

Charlotte Hornets owner George Shinn will be honored as the recipient of the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award. Initiated in 1990, the award is given to those individuals whose career achievements exemplify the limitless opportunities within the American free enterprise system.

A native of Kannapolis, N.C., Shinn has worked in a textile mill, washed cars, and was a janitor in a school he

would later own. Aside from the Charlotte Hornets, Shinn also is the owner of baseball's Class AA Charlotte Knights of the Southern League and the Class A Gastonia Rangers of the South Atlantic League. He also owns a real estate development company, automobile dealerships and a publishing company. Shinn is the author of four books on leadership, salesmanship, and personal motivation. In 1990, he was one of 12 people to receive an American Success Award for his work in vocational technical education from President George Bush.
