Investigative reporter to lecture on Middle East

March 18, 1991

Dale Van Atta, one of the youngest and most widely syndicated columnists and investigative reporters in the world, will lecture at Coastal Monday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. His topic will be *From Khomeini to Hussein:* Showdown in the Desert.

Van Atta shares the byline with Jack Anderson in Washington Merry Go Round which has an estimated 50 million daily readers. He holds the key to many doors untried by or locked to other reporters. His persistence in tracking the truth has won him the scrutiny and fury of Presidents, CIA directors, and world leaders from Brezhnez to Yassar Arafat. The FBI has refused to release his file, and he has won the dubious distinction of having his garbage secretly searched by the National Institutes of Health and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms to track his sources of leaked information.

Van Atta has been nominated for seven Pulitzer Prizes for investigative journalism. His most recent nomination was for uncovering the complex Iran-Contra arms for hostages deal.

Van Atta's speeches focus on the hidden forces and motives at work behind every major news story. He

paints a complete picture of national

and international events and supports his insights with thoroughlyresearched facts as well as his own personal experiences.

Since the Ayatollah Khomeini came to power in Iran, U.S. policy in the Middle East has changed dramatically. Van Atta has followed the events closely and has been one of the country's premier sources of information. He was the first to report that Iranian controlled terrorists were responsible for the 1983 bombing of the U.S. Marine Compound in Beirut; in April of 1986, the American public first learned that Reagan

Administration officials were selling arms to "moderate factions" in Iran by reading Van Atta's column; and he was the first to point out the danger of Saddam Hussein, while the U.S. government was still supplying Iraq with weapons and economic aid.

His trips to the Middle East have brought him face to face with terrorism, hostage sights, and such Arab leaders as King Hussein, Yasser Arafat, and Tariq Aziz.
