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

Events planned for Vietnam Moving Wall Exhibit

The college has planned several events to coincide with the exhibit of The Moving Wall, a 219-foot replica of the Vietnam War Memorial, which will be on campus April 4 to 8. The exhibit is free and open to the public.

The Moving Wall is a half-scale replica of the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C. It consists of 74 aluminium panels approximately 40 inches wide by 80 inches high, and contains all of the 58,132 names listed on the original memorial. The exhibit will be wheelchair accessible.

Music of the Vietnam Era, a lecture by Coastal Carolina professor William Prante, will be held Wednesday, April 3 from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. in the Little Theater.

Moving Wall

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Frederick Hart, a Conway native and the artist who created the sculpture that is with the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, will speak Thursday, April 4 from 1 to 2:15 p.m. in Student Center 205.

The Opening Ceremony for The Moving Wall will be held Thursday, April 4 at 7 p.m. The keynote speaker is songwriter and lecturer Brent Burns of Franklin, Tenn., who served in the U.S. Army's 25th Infantry Division and was wounded in action in 1968. Preston McKever-Floyd will give a poetry reading and the Coastal Carolina Gospel Choir will perform. Other participants include the Rev. Tony Campbell and Coastal **Educational Foundation President** Paul Malone. During the ceremony. the honor guard will present the colors and place wreaths at the wall.

The Closing Ceremony will be held Sunday, April 7 at 5 p.m. It will feature the gospel choir, McKever-Floyd, Rabbi Reuben Kesner, and Ron Ingle. The ceremony will conclude with an honor guard salute and gathering of the mementos visitors have left at the wall.

The Moving Wall will be open 24 hours a day from Thursday, April 4 at 7 p.m. until Monday, April 8 at 7 a.m. Area veterans will serve as guides and will help visitors locate names on the wall. Because The Moving Wall is a photographic replica, it will not be possible to make rubbings from the names. As is the custom at the memorial in Washington, visitors may leave pictures and other personal items at the wall. Following the closing ceremony, these items will be collected and saved.

Local civic and veterans organizations, private individuals, and area businesses have donated money and materials to help cover the cost of bringing the wall to Coastal Carolina College. The Horry County Higher Education Commission is also helping to fund the project.

Dale Van Atta to give Kimbel Lecture

Investigative reporter Dale Van Atta will be the Kimbel Distinguished Lecturer Monday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The title of Van Atta's presentation is From Khomeini to Hussein: Showdown in the Desert.

The lecture is free and open to the public; however, seating is on a first come, first-served basis.

Van Atta and columnist Jack Anderson have recently completed Stormin'Norman, a book about Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf. The book will be released in April. Anderson and Van Atta co-write the column Washington Merry-Go-Round.

A seven-time Pulitzer Prize nominee, Van Atta has reported extensively on the Iran-Contra affair, the Pentagon procurement scandal, Iran's terrorist network, Noriega's drug-running, and the savings and loan scandal. His writing has brought him face to face with such Arab leaders as King Hussein, Yasser Arafat, and Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz. He was the first to report that Iraniancontrolled terrorists were responsible

for the 1983 U.S. Marine Corps Compound bombing in Beirut. Van Atta broke the story that Reagan Administration officials were selling arms to Iran. And he was the first to point out the danger of Saddam Hussein, while the United States was supplying Iraq with weapons and economic aid.

Van Atta was editor of his college newspaper and won numerous regional and collegiate awards for his humor column called *The Vanattatude*, and for his pre-Watergate investigative reporting. Van Atta is a contributor to the *Economist, The Far Eastern Economic Review, Stern, The New York Times, Nation, Time,* and the Washingtonian.

Hornets owner honored

Coastal honored Charlotte Hornets owner George Shinn with the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award during the sixth annual Business Week, held March 18 to 21.

Initiated in 1990, the award is given to individuals whose career achievements exemplify the limitless opportunities within the American free enterprise system. The award is administered through the Wall School of Business and is named in memory of Jason Ammons, a Myrtle Beach businessman. His wife, Tina Ammons Gumm, was on hand for the presentation and luncheon. Scholarships totalling \$2,000 also are awarded through the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Project.

Sally Hare visits Ireland president

Sally Hare has chosen to spend her spring break in a not so traditional fashion. She is visiting Ireland President Mary Robinson. Elected in November 1990, Robinson is the first female president of Ireland.

In reference to the women who turned out to vote in her favor, Robinson said after the election, "Instead of rocking the cradle, they rocked the system." — a quote that piqued Hare's interest and prompted her to write a letter to Robinson asking for a meeting. A response came shortly thereafter, and Hare booked a flight for a 10-day excursion to Ireland.

In addition to meeting with the President in her Dublin home, Hare will travel to Belfast to meet with representatives of the Irish Peace Institute and Cooperation North, two groups trying to ease tensions between the people of the free Irish states and British-ruled North Ireland.

The trip is part of Hare's Kellogg fellowship program. \sim

The result is a testament to Truffaut's faith in the idea that youth can triumph over despair.

Funding for Humanities Building at House Ways and Means Committee

The new building to house the School of Humanities and Fine Arts is one step closer to being a reality.

Rep. Dick Elliott (D-Horry County) has played an instrumental role in getting \$500,000 to finance architectural and engineering for the building placed on the House Ways and Means Committee's recommendation list.

Elliott said, "Sometime last September we started pressing to get the funding for the new Humanities building cut into the state bond bill. The key and critical juncture was passed last week, when the House Ways and Means Committee OK'd the A and E funds."

The proposed Humanities Building will house the academic departments of English, foreign languages, theater, music, history, religion and philosophy. It will contain approximately 50 classrooms and instructional laboratories, 10 conference rooms, offices for 95 faculty, a 200-seat lecture hall and a 300-seat auditorium. It is hoped the building will be completed in 1995, three years after the completion of the new Wall School of Business Building, which is under construction.

"Without the tenacity of Rep. Elliott and the commitment of the entire legislative delegation, the progress toward breaking ground for the new Humanities Building would not be possible," said Chancellor Ron Eaglin.

"I feel extremely good that we're going to get the state allocation that is required to build. Once it survives this phase, it's terribly difficult to remove an item from the funding project," said Elliott.

The next step in the budget process will be for the bond bill to go to the full House floor and then to the Senate Finance Committee. If the recommendation survives, it will appear before the governor for his signature. \sim

Conference on Women to be held April 6

Coastal's 10th annual Conference on Women will be held Saturday, April 6 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Keynote speaker is Christine King Farris, sister of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. The conference – Women: The Creators of Change – is \$59 and includes lunch.

Included on the program are panelists who will address mothering, breast cancer, women and war, gender differences in language, women in higher education, women's crafts and books, women's ways of management, and more.

Christine King Farris is the director of The Reading Program at Spelman College in Atlanta, where she is an associate professor of education. She also is senior vice president of the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, Inc., and founder and chairman of the board of directors of the Martin Luther King Jr. Child Development Center. Her other activities include affiliations with Georgia Right-to-Read Advisory Council, Atlanta Urban League, NAACP, and International Reading Association.

Farris earned master of arts degrees in social foundations of education and in special education from Columbia University in New York City. Her bachelor's degree is in economics from Spelman College.

Coastal Professors receive USC Faculty Exchange Awards

Five Coastal professors have received USC Faculty Exchange awards to conduct research at USC Columbia this summer.

The professors are Michael Ferguson, biology; William E. Hills, psychology; Sylvia Kenig, sociology; Jill Sessoms, English; and Kenneth Townsend, history.

Ferguson will study plant disease, particularly fungal pathogens that damage turf on lawns and golf courses, in the USC Institute for Biological Research and Technology.

Hills will work at the S.C. Gerontology Center to examine gerontology curriculum models and resource networks. He will begin writing a handbook on brain function in older people.

Kenig will research how social class and race influenced nursing in South Carolina.

Sessoms will work on an article on the importance of family in the novels of Anne Tyler.

Townsend will conduct research and begin writing a book about life on the home front in the South during World War II.

The Coastal professors are among 15 faculty in the USC system who received exchange awards this year through a university program designed to improve faculty opportunities in teaching, research, professional development, and service.

The program is sponsored by the Office of the Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost and the Office of the Chancellor for University Campuses and Continuing Education.
