AT&T Challenge tally is in – Coastal students top nation in game

When Coastal business students competing in the AT&T Collegiate Investment Challenge heard they finished first in the country of the more than 11,000 college and university students participating, they were elated, and Merrill Lynch threw a party for them. What they didn't know was how they fared against their classmates.

The final tally of Coastal's participants is in and senior finance major Jay Beck of Marcellus, N.Y. has finished eighth in the nation and first for Coastal. His portfolio increased more than 152 percent between

Coastal to host business ethics expert

Nationally-known business ethics leader W. Michael Hoffman, Ph.D., will speak Monday, April 15 at 6 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The program, Can Business Be Both Successful and Ethical?, is free and open to the public.

Hoffman is the founding director of the Center for Business Ethics, a center established in 1976 at Bentley College in Waltham, Mass. to provide a nonpartisan forum for the exchange of ideas on business ethics in contemporary society. The center also provides conferences, publications, video tapes, bibliographies, surveys, curricular materials, and consultation

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November and February and is worth more than \$1.2 million. For his effort, Beck won a \$2,000 cash scholarship and a week's vacation for two in the Bahamas.

Participants are issued a \$500,000 fictitious account at the start of the contest. The object of the AT&T Challenge is to buy and sell any of 4,500 stocks in an attempt to maximize the value of the account. This is Coastal's second year in the competition

Joe Philpot, a senior from Greenville, finished 35th in the nation, showing a portfolio value increase of 110 percent. His portfolio is worth more than \$1 million.

Duane Dawes, a senior from Cary, N.C., finished the competition in 42nd place. His portfolio, worth more than \$1 million, increased in value 105 percent.

Jason Giavara, a senior from Fairfield, Conn., finished the investment game 88th in the nation.

Barbie Gerchak, a sophomore from Garden City, finished 89th in the competition.

Coastal's participants finished the competition in a range from eight to 9,160th place. Coastal business administration professor Gerald Boyles said the two-credit course gave the 59 students in the class an inexpensive and hands-on opportunity to learn what the stock market is all about.

A plaque was presented to the Coastal team by Peter Annicelli, president of Wall Street Games, Inc. of Boston, during the annual Honors Breakfast for the Wall School of Business, held March 20.

Hoffman received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and is chairman of the Department of Philosophy at Bentley College. He has written and edited 13 books, including Business Ethics: Readings and Cases in Corporate Morality, and has published more than 30 articles.

Can Business Be Both Successful and Ethical? is sponsored by the Community Business Ethics Forum, a group of area business leaders who meet to learn and apply ethical theory to community business cases. The 11member group lead by Claudia Cleary and Jack Kendree provides ethics forum experience for community service and professional organizations. The Community Business Ethics Forum does not set ethical standards; rather, the group seeks to raise the level of sensitivity in the field of business ethics through dialogue.

William E. Full, Ph.D., of the Wichita State University Geology Department will present a seminar Friday, April 12 at 12:30 p.m. in SCI

Full will present Squeezing Information From Multidimensional Data Sets: An Example From Granulometry of North Atlantic Deep Sea Sediments. The seminar will focus on sedimentary transport in the North Atlantic as revealed from analysis of sediment

particle shape. Full's method has been used to successfully discover gold in California, identify fossils, trace water flow in Saudi Arabian oil fields and to distinguish sand from various rivers.
