Richard Collin featured in final segment of Open Book Series

Richard O. Collin will present Sex, Lies, and Political Science on Tuesday, April 16 at 7 p.m., in GCEC 003 as part of the Waccamaw Regional Studies Center's special fivepart series, "Charles Joyner Presents the Open Book Series." The program is free and open to the public.

The series features Coastal faculty and administrators who shared their careers and lives in higher education – their best and worst moments, and what made them devote their lives to higher education.

Collin has been a writer and analyst of contemporary political affairs for more than 25 years. His graduate studies at Harvard Univer-

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sity were interrupted when he was called to active duty from the U.S. Army; he spent two years in the Pentagon as a briefing officer, serving under the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence. Becoming a civilian official for the Defense Intelligence Agency, Collin was stationed in Rome for five years, serving as Chief of the Intelligence Collection Branch of the DIA stationed in Italy.

In the early 1970s, Collin travelled extensively in the Middle East and parts of Africa. During this period, he witnessed the beginning of the civil war in Lebanon, the start of the famine in Sub-Saharan Africa, the last years of the civil war in Oman, and the events leading to the fall of the Shah of Iran and the capture of the American hostages.

Collin completed his graduate work at Oxford University, where he received his doctorate in 1983. He joined the Department of Government at Coastal in 1984 and was promoted to full professor in 1989. Collin was elected Distinguished Professor of the Year in 1987-1988 by Coastal students.

As a scholar, Collin has studied the roots of political violence: he has interviewed Palestinian guerrillas, Red Brigades militants, and a former leader of the Irish Republican Army. His latest book, about Italian terrorism in the early 1980s, is called Winter of Fire: The Abduction of General Dozier and the Fall of the Red Brigades. It was published in September 1989.

The Open Book Series is sponsored by Coastal's Waccamaw Center for Regional Studies under the direction of Charles Joyner,
Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History and Culture.
Other Coastal faculty and administrators who have presented are Gerald Groves, professor of English; Sally Z. Hare, dean of Graduate and Continuing Education; Roy Talbert Jr., professor of history and chairelect of the Department of History; and Sally M. Horner, vice chancellor for Planning and Fiscal Affairs.

Marine Science for Junior Scholars registration opens

Marine Science for Junior Scholars, a program conducted through the Department of Marine Science, will be held June 16 to 29 at the college. Application deadline is April 30.

The program provides two weeks of intensive exposure to the various aspects of marine science for top rising ninth- and 10th-grade students from South Carolina. Since the program's inception four years ago, more than 120 students have participated in extensive field, laboratory and classroom work while studying the biological, geological, chemical and physical processes of

South Carolina's shore. For scientific excursions, students have access to Coastal's 32-foot research vessel, MS Coastal. Laboratory analysis is completed back on campus under the supervision of the Department of Marine Science faculty.

Participants stay in the residence halls on campus. The program is \$750; financial assistance is available. To be eligible for the program, a student must be 14 years old by June 16 and be identified as a Junior Scholar by his or her school.

The Glass Menagerie is presented by Coastal Carolina Theater.

First produced professionally in 1945, The Glass Menagerie is considered by many to be Williams' finest achievement. Set in spring 1939, it is a gripping comment on pre-World War I America. The conflict between an artist's soul and the confines of Depression-era America, and between the soft determination of the memories of antebellum Mississippi and the reality of the industrial revolution, give the play the energy that drives it forward.

Directed by Charles Whetzel, the lighting and costume design for

the play is by Ken Parks.

Doris Hudson, who plays the mother, Amanda, is a language arts teacher and director of theater at Conway High School. She has appeared on the Wheelwright stage in Bell Book and Candle and South Pacific, and she directed Morning's at Seven for the Theater of the Republic last spring.

Auburn Boyd, who plays Amanda's daughter, Laura, is a Coastal sophomore majoring in dramatic arts. Last seen as Anna in And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little, Boyd also has appeared in Bus Stop.

Michael Kelly, who plays
Amanda's son, Tom, is a Coastal

addition to his acting, Kelly works in
the Coastal scene shop. His most
recent appearance was in the 1991
Spring Arts Festival Readers Theater
production of *The Third World War*.

Coastal is sponsoring the college's first summer academic program to Mexico. On May 11, a group of students will leave Coastal for Guanajuato, Mexico, located approximately 250 miles northwest of Mexico City.

During the five-week session, students will earn six hours of college credit in conversational Spanish and Mexican literature while they are taught by Spanish Professor Ed Hood and a faculty member from the University of Guanajuato. Included in the program are trips to Guadalajara, San Miguel de Allende and other areas of interest. The group will return to South Carolina June 17.

The price of the trip is \$1,950 and includes air fare to and from Myrtle Beach, lodging, meals and tuition. Enrollment is limited.
