Ernest Finney, Ruby Forsythe to receive honorary degrees at commencement

State Supreme Court Justice Ernest Adolphus Finney Jr. and educator Ruby Middleton Forsythe will receive honorary degrees during commencement Sunday, May 5 at 2 p.m. at the soccer stadium.

Finney, born in Smithfield. Va. in 1931, began his career in 1954 as a teacher in the Horry County public schools. With a law degree from South Carolina State College School of Law, he practiced law from 1955 to 1976. Finney was a member of the South Carolina House of Representatives from 1972 to 1976. during which time he was a founder and charter chairman of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus. He was elected resident judge of the Third Judicial Circuit in 1976, a position he held until he became associate judge on the South Carolina Supreme Court on July 22, 1985.

Finney has served as chairman of the South Carolina Advisory Committee on Civil Rights and is a member of the State Elections Commission.

He holds a life membership in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Finney will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Ruby Middleton Forsythe, known to many as "Miss Ruby," has been featured in national publications and on national television for her more than 60 years of teaching in South Carolina. She has taught at the one-room Holy Cross Faith Memorial School in Pawleys Island for more than 50 years.

Born in Charleston in 1905, Forsythe earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education and completed graduate studies at South Carolina State College. She began her teaching career in Mt. Pleasant in 1924. Fifteen years later she came to Faith Memorial School in Pawleys Island.

An Episcopalian, Forsythe was married to the late Rev. William Essex Forsythe, an Episcopalian priest. Together, they built the philosophy of the one-room Faith Memorial School based on honesty, dependability, regard for the rights of others and discipline.

Forsythe also operates a twoweek camp for retarded children each spring and directs additional camps through the summer.

In 1978, Forsythe was chosen Georgetown County's "Outstanding Older American" by the South Carolina Commission of Aging and Waccamaw Regional Office on Aging. In 1988, she received the USC Coastal Carolina College Lifetime Achievement Award in Education.

Forsythe will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters. \sim

Coastal to host math anxiety conference

The Mathematics Department is hosting a one-day mathematics anxiety conference Friday, May 3 from 10 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. on campus. The conference, *From Anxiety to Success*, is free and open to the public; however, lunch is \$6. Registration is required.

Math anxiety is a reality afflicting a large segment of the population—including college students and graduates. Guest speakers who will address recent research on math anxiety are Miriam Leiva, program director of the Teachers Preparation Program, National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C. and Merrie Schroeder, mathematics consultant for 43 Iowa school districts.

Educators from Horry, Georgetown, Williamsburg and Marion counties are encouraged to attend the conference as are students and faculty.

Program to honor South Carolina Pulitzer Prize winner set

The Waccamaw Center for Historical and Cultural Studies at Coastal is sponsoring Julia Peterkin Remembered: South Carolina Pulitzer Prize Winner Saturday, May 4 from 3 to 5 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

Peterkin was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1929 for the novel Scarlet's Sister Mary. According to Charles Joyner, Burroughs Distinguished Professor of History at Coastal and moderator of the program, Peterkin was the first white novelist in America to treat black life seriously and with respect. Peterkin lived in Calhoun County and spent her summers in Murrells Inlet. Joyner said certain settings in Scarlet's Sister Mary will be recognizable to area residents as references are made to Sandy Island and Brookgreen.

Peterkin's daughter-in-law Genevieve Chandler Peterkin of Murrells Inlet will speak during the program. She will be joined by novelist Elizabeth Boatwright Coker of Hartsville. Coker was inducted into the South Carolina Writers Hall of Fame in 1991. Coastal professors Veronica Gerald and Preston McKever-Floyd will do readings.

The event is funded by grants from the Burroughs Fund and the Waccamaw Center for Historical and Cultural Studies. With the Waccamaw Center for Historical and Cultural Studies and Coastal, the program is sponsored by The Pee Dee Heritage Center – a joint endeavor of Coker College, Francis Marion College and The South Carolina Governor's School for Science and Mathematics.
