Honors Convocation: Awarding academic achievement

Coastal honored top academic students and faculty members during the annual Honors Convocation held Sunday, April 28.

The Academic Excellence Award recognizes outstanding academic achievement by a senior student. The 1991 recipient is senior history major Stacia Baker. Baker has been on the President's Honor Roll each semester since fall 1987 when she enrolled at Coastal. She plans to move to Washington, D.C. after graduation and hopes to attend law school and specialize in environmental law. Selected by a faculty committee with representatives from each school of the college, candidates for the award must have attained a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5, the endorsement of a faculty adviser, and a record of academic honors throughout their enrollment at Coastal.

The Ronald D. Lackey
Service Award, named in honor of a
faculty member and college chaplain,
is given to a senior on the basis of
conspicuous service to the college
through involvement and leadership
in campus organizations. Donna
Radcliffe, a senior marine science
major, was presented the award by
Chancellor Ron Eaglin. Radcliffe will

The Horry County Higher Education Commission has awarded Horry County School Awards totalling more than \$317,000 since 1981. In the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, the 30 scholarship awardees received full in-state tuition grants of \$875 each semester, totalling \$64,308. The Horry County School Award is renewable for up to eight semesters.

"This scholarship helps us to attract the best students we can to Coastal Carolina College," said Clark Parker, chairman of the Institutional Support Committee of the Horry County Higher Education Commission. "Important to the academic environment on campus, the scholarship awards also are critical to the future of Horry County. Hopefully the students receiving this award will decide to live and pursue careers in Horry and Georgetown counties when they are graduated," Parker

In addition to the Horry
County School Award for top-ranking
high school seniors, the Horry
County Higher Education Commission funds the following: the Horry
County Adult Education Award,
Distress Grants, Teacher Cadet
Program, Excellence to Coastal
Scholarships, Minority Scholarships,
and Junior Marine Science Scholarships.

The South Carolina General Assembly created the Horry County Higher Education Commission in 1959 to oversee the use of Coastal's county tax dollars. Today, the Commission oversees a more than \$400,000 budget that, aside from scholarships and tuition assistance, includes funding in areas such as faculty and staff development, capital improvements, and development centers.

The Coastal Educational Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award was presented to Charles Whetzel. Whetzel is chairman of the Theater Department. He has directed, designed sets and performed in numerous plays since he joined the faculty at Coastal in 1989. He earned his master's degree in fine arts in 1983 from the University of South Carolina. The Distinguished Teaching Award recognizes faculty who have demonstrated excellence in teaching. A student committee solicits nominations from students. Top candidates then receive classroom visitations and are interviewed by the committee.

The Student Affairs Division Award, presented to Jill Sessoms, honors faculty who have made significant contributions to the quality of student life through participation and leadership in the co-curricular activities of the college. Sessoms is an assistant professor of English. She advises the Coastal yearbook staff and Delta Phi Omega. She also has been an adviser to the Sophomore Class and the Creative Writing Club. She earned her Ph.D. from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1982 and joined the Coastal faculty in 1984.
