Chancellor elected to AASCU position

Chancellor Ron Eaglin has been elected to the 1991 Nominating Committee of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Eaglin is one of six presidents from throughout the country elected to the committee. The group will develop the slate of candidates for the organization's board of directors. Other members are presidents from the University of Puerto Rico, California State University, University of Akron, University of Wisconsin, Midwestern State University and Cayey University. Members of the nominating committee are selected from the organization's leadership.

Eaglin also is chairing the AASCU Academic Affairs Committee.

Based in Washington, D.C., AASCU is a higher education association representing more than 375 state colleges and universities.

This is the second time this year Eaglin has been elected to a post in a national collegiate organization. In January, he was elected to the National Collegiate Athletic Association President's Commission, a group of 44 college and university presidents representing more than 290 NCAA-member schools in the U.S. ~

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bished Little Theater. Thursday, Friday and Saturday performances begin at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday performances are at 3 p.m. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students and children, and are available beginning Monday, June 3 from the Wheelwright Box Office, open daily from noon to 5 p.m. (The production schedule is on page 4.)

The season opener is Neil Simon's modern comedy classic *The Odd Couple* featuring Charles Whetzel and Richard Jennings, director of theater graduate studies at USC Columbia. The trials and tribulations of Oscar Madison and Felix Unger have been performed thousands of times in dozens of languages, and have been adapted for the television series and a feature film.

The summer musical is Broadway's newest revue sensation *Closer Than Ever*. Written by David Shire and Richard Maltby Jr., *Closer Than Ever* is a musical celebration of growing older, and of the anguish, amazement and human comedy of contemporary living. The play is directed by Scott Blanks, director of theater at Benedict College in Columbia.

The final summer production is James McLure's hilarious and provocative companion one-act plays *Lone Star* and *Private Wars*. Both plays center around soldiers who have come

home from the Vietnam War. *Lone Star* introduces Roy, a soldier who cannot function except behind Angel's Bar and Grill. His brother, Ray, provides the love and support Roy needs to learn to function in society. In *Private Wars*, three soldiers strike an unlikely friendship while recuperating in a veteran's hospital. Sandi Shackelford is the director. Both plays contain strong language.

Combining the talents of college faculty, students, local actors, technicians and theater and music professionals, the Summer Repertory Theater was formed under the leadership of Charles Whetzel following the successful production of the *The Fantasticks* in summer 1990.

"We wanted to give our students the opportunity to work with the repertory system and to provide a summer theater for area residents," said Whetzel. The cooperation of the college administration and a \$4,000 grant from the Horry Cultural Arts Council helped to make this project possible.

The company is composed of 26 actors, technicians and musicians. John Durrell is coordinating the program. Whetzel and David Millard are the producers.

Family Fund distributes first endowment earnings

In its first distribution of endowment earnings, the Family Fund Endowment committee has voted to allocate \$1000 to assist in meeting medical expenses for Dr. Ronald Lackey.

Lackey, chaplain for the college and associate professor of philosophy and religion, has been confined to a wheelchair since the loss of both legs to diabetes and serious complications resulting from the disease. The decision to offer assistance was made in consideration of the enormous medical costs incurred and the fact that Lackey has continued to carry a class load in spite of his illness.

The Family Fund Endowment committee consists of five faculty members and five staff members who lead fund raising efforts during the Family Fund drive each fall semester. The committee also determines the use of earnings from contributions made to the Family Fund Endowment. Earnings from the endowment are distributed on an annual basis.

Young People's College begins July 15

Coastal will hold the ninth annual Young People's College, a summer program for children ages 4 through 14, Monday, July 15 to Thursday, Aug. 8. Classes are organized by age groups and are offered Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

The program is co-sponsored by the Myrtle Beach Parks and Recreation Department. Instruction is provided by Coastal faculty, area teachers, and members of the community.

"Young People's College is a terrific opportunity for children to take advantage of creative courses set in non-traditional classrooms. This program encourages children to delve into exciting and adventurous new areas of learning," said program coordinator Debbie Purcell.

Course topics include: swimming and diving, racquet sports, gymnastics, bubble chemistry, play writing and acting, art, backyard critters, reading, challenge course, kites and mythology, marketing, music, rock-etry, cartoons and caricatures, Italy, baseball legends, cooking, and more.

Pre-school Young People's College, held in conjunction with the regular sessions, will be held at Canal Street Recreation Center and Myrtle Beach Primary School for ages 4 through 8. Sessions include literature and storytelling, and the whole language experience.

Charles Whetzel receives Distinguished Teaching Award

Charles Whetzel has received the Distinguished Teaching Award for 1990-1991. The annual award recognizes faculty who have demonstrated excellence in teaching.

Whetzel is the chairman of the Department of Theater. From 1989 to 1991, he was an assistant professor of theater.

Whetzel has directed more than 30 plays, has acted professionally in 30, and has acted in 25 educational and community theater productions. He has designed sets for more than 60 productions. He also has produced video and scripts and has acted in television roles, including work for South Carolina Educational Television and South Carolina Department of Social Services.

Whetzel has taught classes including introduction to theater, history of theater, acting, directing, play production, modern and contemporary drama, stagecraft, oral interpretation of literature, theater management, fundamentals of speech, and fundamentals of communication in small groups. He has taught at the high school, community college and college levels.

Under the direction of Whetzel, the Coastal Carolina College Summer Theater Program has blossomed from a single-production season to a six-week schedule of three productions in repertory.

Whetzel has been a South Carolina Humanities Council scholar-in-residence, providing an out-reach program for area high schools that includes in-class visitations and workshops. He also has served on the Project 2000 committee reviewing fine arts in area high schools.

"I am challenged to build a program that the students, the college and the community can respect and to involve the community in the production program so that the college becomes a center for culture for the area," Whetzel said.

"In the classroom, I teach students to teach themselves. Effective learning takes place in an environment where comfort and challenge are equal partners. Teachers open minds, direct student probing and comfort fears. In this atmosphere of working together to learn and grow, students can venture beyond the simple and the obvious. They can become comfortable taking risks. Too much nurturing in the absence of challenge or too much challenge in the absence of nurturing do not enable effective learning. In all my classes the rules are the same - trust yourself and trust me, and challenge yourself and challenge me," Whetzel said.

Transfer program approved

Horry-Georgetown Technical College and Coastal Carolina College formalized an articulation agreement which will make it easier for students who begin associate degree programs at HGTC to transfer to Coastal Carolina to complete baccalaureate programs.

HGTC President Kent Sharples and Coastal Carolina Chancellor Ron Eaglin agree that the plan will benefit local students.

"Our two institutions have forged a landmark agreement which will afford our citizens an even greater access to higher education," said Sharples. "The sense of *esprit de corps* evident between our colleges has made this a labor of tremendous cooperation. The resulting agreement has paved the way for and set the stage for great things in the future."

"In developing the transfer program, the needs of students were our main concern," said Eaglin. "Our institutions have implemented a plan that enables students to plan their educational programs early, to select appropriate courses, and to meet their long-range educational goals. This agreement is also a tribute to the cooperative efforts of faculty at both institutions. Their work will open new doors for students and enhance a long-term relationship of exchange and interaction between our colleges."

HGTC Vice President for Education Neyle Wilson, Coastal Carolina Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Ron Ingle, and faculty and administrators from both institutions began working on the agreement last fall. According to Wilson, the majority of HGTC's transfer students will most likely enroll at Coastal Carolina.

Ingle said that HGTC students who plan to transfer to Coastal should plan their schedules accordingly. He also recommended that they review their plans with Dr. Thomas Isekenegbe in the Academic Affairs Office or Marsha Griffin, director of Career Development, Placement, and Recruitment at HGTC.

Coastal has established the policies regarding transfer of credits from HGTC. Copies are available from Academic Affairs. ~
