Chancellor appointed to NCAA committee

Chancellor Ron Eaglin has been appointed to the NCAA Presidents Commission Subcommittee to Review NCAA Revenue-Distribution Principles.

The special subcommittee was formed with representatives of two members from Division I-A schools and one from each Division I-AA, I-AAA, II, and III schools. The six-member subcommittee is charged with reviewing revenue distribution recommendations for the first year of the seven-year NCAA basketball television contract.

Each representative was nominated and elected to serve on the

International, foreign language studies enrichment program gets grant

For the third consecutive year, Coastal has been awarded a \$75,000 federal grant to continue the Comprehensive Enrichment Program in International and Foreign Language Studies.

Awarded by the U.S. Department of Education, the grant supports a comprehensive international studies program for a 10-member consortium of colleges and universities in South Carolina. The aim of the program is to internationalize the campuses of member schools.

committee following the April meeting of the NCAA President's Commission, of which Eaglin has been a member since his four-year term began in January 1991.

As one of 44 commission members representing more than 290 NCAA member schools in the nation and the only Division I representative of the 1991 commission from South Carolina, Eaglin serves as an at-large Division I-AAA representative. Coastal is a Division I-AAA non-football member of the NCAA. The commission includes representatives from NCAA conferences including the ACC, Big Eight, Big Ten, Big West, Pac-10 and SEC. ♦

Coastal to host summer cheerleading camp

Nationally-ranked USC Columbia cheerleaders will be at Coastal Aug. 5 through 8 for a four-day summer camp to be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The camp is open to individuals or teams, ages 6 to 18. Held in Kimbel Gymnasium, the camp includes cheers, chants, dance, tumbling, stunts, evaluations and awards. The cost is \$65 a person.

The grant for the 1991-1992 academic year will be matched with \$46,963 in college funds and approximately \$6,000 in contributions from participating institutions. The three-year total of federal funds received for the program is \$225,000, or 61 percent of the total cost of the project. College funds earmarked for the three-year program total \$122,636 and contributions from participating institutions total approximately \$23,000.

Coastal heads the statewide program under the direction of Fred Hicks. According to Hicks, the program is helpful in developing new courses in international relations at Coastal and at the consortium schools; the program internationalizes existing courses by bringing them up-to-date with changing world situations; the program expands and enables the libraries to progress in the acquisition of learning resources (books, video tapes, maps) for humanities, international and government programs; and the program assists in developing foreign language curricula.

Geoff Parsons, who is the program coordinator at Coastal, said the

program helps sensitize the faculty of the consortium schools to the incorporation of a more global view into their courses and to promoting an international awareness on their campuses. "We need to be increasingly sensitive to differences in culture and we need to expose our students to things not cast in the traditional western mold," Parsons said. "It helps prepare graduates to be more competitive in the marketplace."

The program provides conferences, workshops, interlibrary loans, resource materials, and financial support. "Many of the schools which are members of the consortium are small minority schools, and are not heavily endowed. The program helps these schools participate when they ordinarily could not," Parsons said.

This fall, Coastal will host a two-day workshop, "Introduction to the Oral Proficiency Interview." Set for Sept. 20 and 21, the workshop is for faculty from the consortium schools.

In addition to Coastal, consortium members include: Allen University, Benedict College, Morris College, South Carolina State College, Voorhees College, USC Aiken, USC Beaufort, USC Salkehatchie, and USC Union. ♦

Hicks to lead Coastal delegation to Cyprus

Fred Hicks will lead a delegation to Cyprus in summer 1992 as part of his Fulbright studies.

Hicks has been appointed the Fulbright Professor in Cyprus for 1991 and 1992 by the Fulbright High Commission in Cyprus. As a consultant to the director of higher education in Cyprus, Hicks has assisted in the drafting of regulations governing and accrediting private institutions of higher education in the Republic. His appointment over the two-year period includes five concentrated visits to Nicosia, the capital of Cyprus.

"The government of Cyprus is establishing a system of quality control and accreditation. During the six months I spent in Cyprus, I assisted in drafting the laws and regulations being considered by the

Council of Ministers and the Legislature of Cyprus," Hicks said. "Next summer, the delegation will start the process of sharing our knowledge of accreditation and initiating the self-study process with our colleagues in Cyprus."

Delegates from Coastal include Ron Eaglin, Elizabeth Puskar, Karen Carpenter, Jack Riley, Marios Katsioloudes, James Farsolas, Stephen Nagle, Sara Sanders, Glenda Sweet, and Lance Bedwell. Representatives from the Washington D.C.-based Council on Post Secondary Accreditation and from the Atlanta-based Southern Association Commission on Colleges and Universities also will join the delegation.

The seminar is funded by the government of Cyprus and the Fulbright Commission in Cyprus. ♦
