Registration for fall semester set

Undergraduate registration for the fall semester will be held Monday, Aug. 19 through Thursday, Aug. 22 in the Registrar's Office. Classes begin Monday, Aug. 26 and end Friday, Dec. 13.

Undergraduate courses are offered in anthropology, art education, art history, art studio, astronomy, biology, business administration, chemistry, computer science, economics, education, English, French, geography, geology, German, government and international studies, health education, history, Latin, marine science, mathematics, music, music education, philosophy, physical education, physics, psychology, recreation, religion, sociology, Spanish, statistics, and theater.

Before registering, new undergraduate students must apply to Coastal through the Office of Admis-

Continuing and accepted undergraduate students should register according to the day and time on appointment notices mailed to their permanent addresses in August. Graduate students may register at any time during scheduled registration hours.

Coastal also offers undergraduate evening courses on the Coastal and Georgetown campuses, and at the Myrtle Beach Air Force Base.

Graduate courses through USC Graduate and Regional Studies are offered in education and psychology. Monthly Budget **Program for** tuition offered

To assist students in planning and budgeting educational expenses, Coastal offers the Monthly Budget Program - an alternative budgeting service which divides annual tuition costs into manageable monthly payments.

The application fee for MBP is \$45. Life insurance, to protect the annual budgeted amount, is included in the program at no extra cost. Since the MBP is not a loan, there are no additional interest or finance

charges.

To apply, students must complete a special worksheet outlining educational expenses and expected income and funding assistance. Once the application is received and approved, an account will be opened in the student's name. A statement will be sent to the student each month just before the monthly payment is due. Payments will automatically be submitted to Coastal. A record of each student's account will be maintained for the student and for Coastal.

The MBP is offered through The Tuition Plan, a subsidiary of Manufacturers Hanover Corporation.
