

Recipients sought for Ruby M. Forsythe Memorial Scholarship

USC Coastal Carolina College and Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. are welcoming applicants for the Ruby M. Forsythe Memorial Scholarship. Established in 1990, the scholarship is a memorial to the Pawleys Island educator. Preference for the scholarship is given to applicants from the Waccamaw Neck area of Georgetown County.

More than 50 years ago, Forsythe began teaching at Holy Cross—Faith Memorial School in Pawleys Island. The philosophy of the one-room school is for students to develop selfreliance and initiative and be guided by an appreciation of opportunity and a sense of responsibility. Last year, Forsythe taught 72 children, ages three to nine, in the one-room school.

With more than 65 years of teaching experience, Forsythe received the Coastal Carolina College Lifetime

Area Agency on Aging begins supplemental income program

The Waccamaw Area Agency on Aging will begin the Supplemental Security Outreach Coalition Program in Georgetown and Williamsburg counties with a special program Friday, September 20 at 10 a.m. at the Georgetown County Library, 405 Cleland Street, Georgetown. The public is invited to attend the program and to participate in the coalition as volunteers. Registration is required for the training sessions that follow the program. Agency staff members also will participate in the training sessions.

The coalition is a group of agencies formed to assist persons with limited income who are over age 65, blind, or disabled to apply for SSI benefits. For those who qualify, SSI pays cash benefits each month, and in South Carolina, allows for automatic health insurance eligibility under Medicaid.

Speakers for the training sessions include state Rep. Ken Kennedy of Greeleyville; Mayor Lovith Anderson of Andrews; Robert Hazel, administrative vice president for the Southeastern Division of South Carolina Electric and Gas; and a representative of the Social Security Administration.

The project is funded in Charleston, Columbia, and Florence by the American Association of Retired Persons with a grant from the Commonwealth Fund Commission on Elderly People Living Alone. The Charleston project covers nine counties, including Georgetown and Williamsburg, and is co-sponsored regionally by South Carolina Electric and Gas.

The Waccamaw Area Agency on Aging, a division of Coastal Carolina College, is an umbrella organization for services to older persons in Horry, Georgetown, and Williamsburg counties.

Achievement Award in Education in 1988. She was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of South Carolina during May 1991 commencement exercises at Coastal.

Scholarship holders, selected by Coastal's scholarship committee, must be full-time students and maintain at least a 2.75 grade point ratio. Selection of recipients is determined on the basis of individual motivation toward higher education, student's potential for academic achievement and financial need. Students who qualify for the scholarship may be eligible for up to full-tuition for a full year. Awards are made annually.

The Ruby M. Forsythe Scholarship has been made possible with the assistance of Litchfield residents Margaret Forbes Grant and Alexander M. Grant, and Murrells Inlet resident and Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. Director Dr. R. Cathcart Smith. The scholarship is one of more than 100 scholarships offered to Coastal students. Applications are due by Feb. 1, 1992.
