Conference on racism and the role of education scheduled

Coastal will host a two-day conference, Healing the Wounds of Racism: Education's Role, Friday, October 4 and Saturday, October 5.

The conference, to be held on campus, is open to elementary and high school educators, higher education faculty and administrators, student service personnel, school board members, community leaders, parents and college students. The conference will provide an opportunity for participants to identify, discuss, and find solutions to racial issues, and to build networks that will prompt change.

The conference was organized in response to an increase in cultural conflicts and racial incidents in schools throughout the country. As a broad spectrum of students with a variety of cultural backgrounds are coming together in the classroom and on campuses, educators and administrators are pledging a commitment to providing students with the most well-rounded academic experience possible to counteract such racial problems.

"Our children are this nation's most precious resource. This means all children – not some children," said Jessie Brown, professor of education. "As such, this nation must ensure that each child has the opportunity to

develop to the fullest extent possible."

Among the conference speakers are: Pat Callair, a member of the National Speakers Circuit, where she frequently speaks on racism issues; South Carolina Superintendent of Education Barbara Nielsen; and John Mangieri, provost and vice chancellor of academic and student affairs at the University of New Orleans, and the author of an awardwinning plan outlining how to best deal with racial, cultural and ethnic diversity on college campuses.

More than 15 sessions with different speakers have been planned. Topics include such titles as: The Psychology of Prejudice; How to Take Prejudice and Racism Out of the Curriculum; Stereotypes: Who Discriminates Against Whom?; and Dealing With Racism and Prejudice in the Classroom and on Campus.

Sessions will be held Friday, October 4 from 1:30 to 6 p.m. and Saturday, October 5 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Exhibits will be on display both days.

Conference registration is \$25 for Coastal faculty, staff, and students or \$75 for the general public.

Lecouras receives Department of Education grant

Peter Lecouras has been awarded \$54,832 by the U.S. Department of Education for the funding of the "Horry County Drug-Free Schools and Communities Counselor Training Project." This grants program was authorized by the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1986 and the Amendments of 1989. Lecouras will serve as project director of the one-year grant.

The purpose of the grant is to provide 56 hours of training to the guidance counselors of the Horry

County school system. This training project will provide an opportunity for guidance counselors of the Horry County School District to receive three hours of graduate credit through Graduate and Continuing Education at Coastal. Others who will be involved in the project are Paul Stanton as faculty member of record for the course. Rick Ginsberg of USC Columbia and Sandy Baird will provide training to the guidance counselors, and Tony Albiniak will evaluate the project.

Third Quarter courses offered at Coastal

The fall 1991 Third Quarter courses, an academic and cultural program for people age 55 or older, will begin Monday, October 14 and continue through Thursday, December 12. Each course meets once a week for nine weeks. No educational prerequisites are required for participation in Third Quarter.

Developed through Graduate and Continuing Education, Third Quarter is supported through a membership fee that covers the cost of courses; a campus parking decal; Coastal identification and student privileges; use of Kimbel Library; and discounts on the purchase of the Wheelwright Passport, an 18-event cultural arts package.

Course offerings include:

- Middle Eastern Religions: Judaism, Christianity, Islam. Examine the shared affinities and connections between these Middle Eastern religions. The class meets Mondays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Preston McKever-Floyd.
- Russian Culture and History.
 This course offers a brief introduction to the major developments in the history of the Soviet Union from 1917 to the present and will focus on the events that have taken place in the Soviet Union and in Europe since Gorbachev came to power in 1985. The class meets Mondays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Instructor: James Farsolas.
- Women and Literature. This course is a comparative study of the images of women in the literature of the American South from the pre-Civil War era to the present. Special emphasis will be given to contemporary writers. The class meets Tuesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Jill Sessoms.
- Creative Writing: Beyond the Basics. Participants in this course will explore strategies for writing and getting published, and will publish an anthology of their own fiction, nonfiction, and poetry at the end of the course. The class meets Tuesdays

from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Instructor: Susan Meyers.

- Economics. This course is designed to familiarize the student with some basic economic models. Discussions will include topics such as the savings and loan flasco, social security and saving, health care, inflation, and national debt. The class meets Wednesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Darcy Carr.
- Introduction to the Great Books. Students will encounter ideas in literature, philosophy, history and psychology and will learn to interpret them in this course. The class meets Wednesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Instructor: Jack Riley.
- Constitutional Development. This course will examine the historical and political factors that led to the drafting of the American Constitution. Primary emphasis will be on the approach to republican government embodied in the Constitution compared to the republicanism of the original state constitutions. The class meets Thursdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Paul Peterson.
- Modern American Drama.
 Classic drama such as Tennessee
 Williams' Streetcar Named Desire,
 Thorton Wilder's Our Town, and
 Lillian Hellman's Little Foxes will be
 studied in this course. The class meets
 Thursdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m.
 Instructor: Virginia Cremen-Rudd.

For one or two classes, the fee is \$35 per course. One person may take up to four courses for \$100. If you have a friend, spouse or neighbor interested in joining Third Quarter, the two of you make take four courses each for \$150 (\$75 per person).

Registration continues through the first week of classes in the Graduate and Continuing Education Office. The office is open Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Cholesterol and Food

(Source: Carolina Healthstyle: State Employee Health Promotion Program)

Cholesterol in the bloodstream comes from two sources: it is produced naturally by the body's cells (endogenous cholesterol) and also results from the intake of foods containing cholesterol or saturated fat (exogenous cholesterol).

Foods that are very high in cholesterol

- · Egg yolk
- Organ meats (liver, kidney, sweet breads, brains)
- Fish roe

Foods that are high in saturated fat

- · Red meats
- · Whole milk, full fat yogurt, cheese
- · Cream, ice cream
- · Cream cheese, full fat cottage cheese
- · Butter, lard, beef tallow
- · Palm and coconut oil
- · Pies and pastries
- · Gravies (some)

Foods with low or no cholesterol

- Fruits and vegetables
- · Cereals, pasta, breads
- Sugars and syrups
- · Nonfat daily products
- Low fat fish
- · Very lean meats
- · Egg whites
- · Soup stock (made without fat)
