The Horry County Higher Education Commission announces the appointment of two new members to fill expired terms. Joan S. Gause of Loris and James C. Page of Conway will each serve four-year terms.

Gause, a guidance counselor with the Horry County School District, has been involved in education for 20 years. She received a bachelor's degree in home economics education from South Carolina State College in 1972 and a master's degree in secondary guidance counseling from the USC in 1983. She is a member of the National Association of Student Activity Advisors and the Finklea Career Center Advisory Council. She is also a member of the Horry County Extension Homemakers Club where in 1987 she placed third as Horry County Extension Homemaker of the Year.

Page is senior vice president of the MBAFB Federal Credit Union. He earned a bachelor's degree is accounting from Western Carolina University in 1971. Page is a member of the South Carolina Credit Union Managers Association and the Conway Optimist Club. He is also a member of the industrial subcommittee of the Conway Chamber of Commerce.

Coastal will be represented at the Summit by several college and community members, including Chancellor Eaglin, along with Edgerton Burroughs and Edward M. Singleton who serve on the Business Advisory Committee of the Council of College Presidents.

Mozart's opera, *The Magic Flute*, to be performed at Coastal

Mozart's opera, *The Magic Flute*, will be presented Tuesday, Nov. 5 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$25 and \$13 for students at the box office.

Sung in English and accompanied by a live orchestra, The Minnesota Opera will perform *The Magic Flute* in celebration of the 200th anniversary of Mozart's writing the piece. *The Magic Flute* was Mozart's final opera and is often considered his most brilliant masterpiece.

First performed at the *Theater auf der Wieden* in Vienna on Sept. 30, 1791, *The Magic Flute* captures a hero's journey – from masks and illusion to truth and reality, from concern for worldly things and titles, to a search for virtuous living and a real understanding of power.

The Minnesota Opera is on a national tour which will take the company to 20 states for 40 performances, reaching an estimated 50,000 opera fans. This marks The Minnesota Opera's 13th year of touring and the beginning of the company's 29th season. The primary goal of the company has been to demystify opera and broaden its appeal to make it more accessible to audiences. The company has expanded its roster over the last decade to include musical theater, children's opera, composer residency programs, master classes, and a myriad of in-school educational programs.

The Magic Flute is funded, in part, by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission which receive support from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Panelist to discuss Wetlands Regulations

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies is hosting a forum, Wetlands Regulations, Thursday, Nov. 7 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at the Myrtle Beach Martinique. The forum is the second of two programs on environmental issues facing the Grand Strand. It is free and open to the public.

Panelists include James Perry of the Virginia Institute of Marine Science; Susan Stiner of LPA Engineering, Columbia; Jake Duncan of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Charleston; and a representative from the Environmental Protection Agency, Washington, D.C. The forum will be moderated by Paul Booth.

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies is partially funded through the Horry County Higher Education Commission. Its mission is to facilitate research of the marine and wetland environment of the area. Ongoing projects include studies of coastal erosion, relative sea level changes, mineral resources and geological framework, wetlands, and water quality.

Talbert writes book on military intelligence

Roy Talbert Jr. recently had a book published by the University Press of Mississippi. The book, Negative Intelligence: The Army and the American Left 1917-1941, is the second he has published in four years.

Talbert's study is the result of several years of research and two decades of interest in the subject. Colleague Richard Collin wrote the following review:

"Talbert's fascination with Military Intelligence (MI) stems from his own experience as an intelligence officer with the United States Army in the early 1970s. When it was publicly revealed that the U.S. Army had been conducting domestic intelligence operations against anti-war activists and political radicals during the Vietnam conflict, the Army asked Talbert to prepare a comprehensive study of MI's role in 'negative intelligence.'

Returning to the subject as a political historian and discovering that much of his own Army work was still classified, Talbert began pushing backwards in time, trying to discover how and when the practice of negative intelligence had begun. The result is a fascinating exploration of the American spy community from the beginning of World War I down to the start of World War II. Convinced that the security of the USA was threatened by subversives, anarchists, Bolsheviks, draft dodgers, birth control advocates, Africian-American activists, and trade union organizers, the Army tried to become a universal intelligence agency, dealing with both domestic and foreign intelligence, and breaking a number of laws in the process."

Talbert attended Furman University on an academic scholarship, graduating with honors in 1965. He accepted a National Defense fellowship at Vanderbilt University, where he earned his master's degree and Ph.D., both in history. He was a captain in the Army, serving in the Directorate of Counterintelligence in the Pentagon, for which he received a Meritorious Service Medal.

Fellini film featured in series

The Italian film Ginger and Fred, will be presented Sunday, Nov. 3 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The film is the third in the seven-part international film segment of the 1991-1992 Wheelwright Passport. Tickets for Ginger and Fred are \$3, or \$2 for students, and are available in advance at the box office.

Fellini brings his unique directing perspective on humanity to this shocking satire of television and modern life. Ginger and Fred features two dance partners reunited after 30 years. Once a touring dance team performing Astaire and Rogers routines around Italy, the dance team is reunited for one last dance on a tacky television variety show, where they finally come to grips with the dreams and illusions that have colored their lives.

The film was released in 1986 and is rated PG-13. It has been called one of Fellini's most enjoyable films.

Long distance calls blocked on local lines

USC Columbia's Computer Services and Communications Division is completing a new contract with MCI for long distance telephone service. The new interstate rates are 20 percent less than previous charges when dialing long distance through Columbia using the 51 access number. Previously, using the Columbia lines for long distance was approximately 10 percent less than using the Conway or Myrtle Beach lines. With the new contract, the cost will be more than 30 percent less by using the Columbia lines.

Most long distance users on campus have been using the Columbia lines, but some have continued to use the Conway and Myrtle Beach lines when calling long distance.

In an effort to reduce telephone

charges, all long distance calls must now be made through the Columbia lines. As of Oct. 21, all long distance calls have been blocked from the local telephone lines.

The procedures for calling long distance are as follows:

In-state:

dial – 51 (pause) 9 (pause) 1 + the seven digit number

Out-of-state:

dial – 51 (pause) 9 (pause) 1 + area code and the seven digit number

Overseas:

dial – 51 (pause) 9 (pause) 0 +1 + 1 + country code, city code, and the seven digit number




