Leave pool donations accepted

Faculty and staff who earn sick leave and annual leave may donate a percentage of their leave hours to a leave pool by Nov. 30 each year. The leave pool is available to eligible faculty and staff who may request use of donated leave for personal emergencies requiring time away from work which would result in a substantial loss of income because of unavailability of paid leave time.

Once leave has been donated to the pool, it can not be restored or returned to the donor unless the donor meets requirements as a leave pool recipient. Donors may not designate the recipient of their leave donated.

The amount of sick leave or annual leave donated may not exceed 50 percent of the total hours accrued in the calendar year. For example, no one can donate more than 56.28 hours of sick leave in a given year.

Wilson Business Abstracts provides cover-to-cover indexing and abstracting for 345 English language business periodicals to which most libraries and business information centers subscribe. It provides complete, accurate, and informative 50 to 150 word abstracts covering all aspects of business. Abstracts are included for biographical sketches, corporate profiles, interviews, produce reviews, and obituaries, in addition to abstracts of articles.

Subjects covered in the abstracts are accounting, advertising, banking, chemical industry, communications,

computer technology and applications, construction industry, drug and cosmetics industries, economics, electronics, finance and investments, industrial relations, insurance, international business, management and personnel administration, marketing, occupational health and safety, paper and pulp industry, petroleum and gas industries, printing and publishing, public relations, public utilities, real estate, regulation of industry, transportation, and more.

USC Chamber Orchestra to perform

The USC Chamber Orchestra, under the direction of Donald Portnoy, will perform as part of the Wheelwright Passport in Wheelwright Auditorium Tuesday, Dec. 3 at 7:30 p.m. The performance is open to the public.

Founded in fall 1986, the USC Chamber Orchestra provides concerts for the university and the community, and functions as a training ground for future professional musicians. The orchestra is primarily composed of USC undergraduate and graduate students. According to Portnoy, it is his aim to provide as much variety in the orchestra's repertoire as possible in order to give the young musicians an edge as they graduate and pursue professional careers at universities and with symphony orchestras across the nation. At Coastal, the USC Chamber Orchestra will perform the works of Handel, Husa, and Mozart.

Portnoy is currently in his fourth season as director of the orchestra. He holds the Ira McKissick Koger Endowed Chair for Fine Arts at USC, where he serves as artistic adviser for the Koger Center for the Arts. A professor of music, Portnoy teaches conducting and violin and is music director of the University Symphony and Chamber Orchestra. He also is conductor of the Pittsburgh Opera Theater, Columbia Lyric Opera, and the Carolina Ballet.

He has appeared as guest conductor of such major orchestras as the Pittsburgh Symphony, Buffalo Philharmonic, and the Baltimore Symphony. In addition to his many conducting engagements throughout this country and overseas, Portnoy is an internationally recognized concert violinist and founder of the American Arts Trio.

Portnoy is a graduate of the Julliard School, Catholic University of America, and the Peabody Conservatory.

Pearl Harbor Commemoration set

To mark the 50th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and the entry of the United States into World War II, a community ceremony will be held Saturday, Dec. 7 at 10 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The ceremony is free and open to the public. A special invitation is extended to World War II veterans.

Local survivors of the Pearl Harbor attack will share their memories. Movietone News reports of the bombing – originally suppressed by the government – will be shown courtesy of the University of South Carolina Newsfilm Library in Columbia. Kenneth Townsend will give a speech, "The Historical Significance of Pearl Harbor Sunday." Townsend's doctoral dissertation explored the subject

of World War II and Native Americans.

The Coastal Carolina College Chantsemble will sing "The Captives Hymn," by Margaret Dryburgh. This piece was composed in Sumatra in a Japanese prison camp for women and children.

Presiding will be the Rev. S. George Lovell. The Rev. Robert W. Hadley, chaplain major of the Myrtle Beach Air Force Base, will deliver the invocation and benediction, and the base Honor Guard will open and close the ceremony.

The ceremony is organized by Coastal's Committee for the 50th Anniversary Commemoration of World War II, 1990-1995.

Fraternity plans Black Lantern Processional

A ceremony dating back to the early years of American education will be re-enacted on campus Friday, Dec. 6. The Black Lantern Processional of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity was born in the mid-1800s at Yale University. Members in dark robes march in silence carrying a Diogenes lantern, the lantern named for the kind of light carried by the Greek philosopher Diogenes in his search for an honest man. The manner of the processional is passed down from the early days at Yale when members of the fraternity marched to various student residences to announce to candidates that they had been selected for membership. The new member was placed into the line of march, and then taken to the fraternity's rooms for his first meeting.

The colorful, solemn ceremony is carried out today on campuses throughout America where Alpha Sigma Phi has chapters. It is used as a memorial for deceased brothers, to commemorate the fraternity's founding, and to welcome new members. The Black Lantern Processional can be viewed at 7 p.m., on Friday, Dec. 6, when members will march from the Residence Halls (Building F) to Kimbel Library. Those watching are asked to respect the solemnity of the ceremony.

Financial Aid receives scholarship info. and applications

Faculty/Staff Dependents' Scholarship applications are now available in the Financial Aid Office from USC Columbia. This scholarship is open to any dependent child or spouse of a full-time USC system employee.

To be eligible for consideration, the applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time undergraduate or graduate student on one of the nine system campuses and have attained a minimum 3.0 GPA. Freshman eligibility is determined by high school class rank and SAT scores. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years provided the recipient maintains a minimum 3.0 GPA.
